# MVF Board Student Rep position open for high school juniors





#### THE PASSING OF FORMER MVF BOARD MEMBER JIM KING

He and his wife, Senator Nancy King, have contributed so much to Montgomery Village over the years. Jim had a quick wit and was always full of suggestions about how to make things better. He will be missed!

#### RECREATION AND PARKS STRATEGIC PLAN

New Recreation and Parks Director Duncan Mullis has initiated a strategic planning process with the goal of establishing a clear, simple statement of actionable strategic priorities for the department over the next 5 years (2018-2023). The process will include a data and research-based assessment of our current positioning; identification of three to five broad strategic priorities of the departments/divisions and associated action plans for implementation; involvement of key stakeholder groups and individuals in the development; and review of strategic priorities. The MVF Board and Recreation Department will be invited to participate as the work is ongoing.

#### RESOLUTION ON TRANSPORTATION SOLUTIONS FOR NORTHWEST MONTGOMERY COUNTY (M-83)

Pete Young testified on October 17 before the county council in support of a resolution that identifies transportation improvements in the upcounty, which do not include the build-out of the northern extension of M-83. In addition, the resolution directs the planning board not to assume additional road capacity from M-83 when calculating transportation capacity for development in the upcounty. The council is expected to vote on this matter by year end.

## SMALL CELL TOWER ZTA

The county continues to try to address how siting of small cell towers in county rights of ways will be addressed in the zoning ordinance in its latest draft of the ZTA. The text is available at this link: www.montgomery countymd.gov/cable/Resources/Files/Towers/documents/ZTA-Telecommunications-tower\_7-27-17.pdf.

In October 2016, at a spirited meeting at Ridgeview Middle School, residents raised many issues to county council members and staff regarding a council proposal to revise the process for approving cell phone towers, especially with regard to siting new shorter towers in residential areas. Applications for these small cell towers has alarmed residents who are concerned about the aesthetic and health impacts of these additional towers in their neighborhoods. These issues continued to be raised at public meetings held in July, September and October this year.

#### **MONTGOMERY VILLAGE NEWS LETTERS TO THE EDITOR POLICY**

- 1. The Montgomery Village News Letters to the Editor section is a community forum for Montgomery Village residents and/or property owners. In addition, at the Editor's discretion, the Montgomery Village News may print letters of appropriate interest to residents from others, including representatives of local schools, governments and businesses. Campaign letters are prohibited, except for Montgomery Village Foundation and Village homes corporation elections. The views expressed in the Letters to the Editor section are those of the authors of the letters and not necessarily those of the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) or its Board of Directors.
- 2. The *Montgomery Village News* will make every effort to publish all letters received during the weeks prior to publication.
- 3. Typed letters and e-mail must be received no later than 5 p.m. on the Monday prior to publication and distribution, while handwritten letters must be received no later than noon on the Friday, one week prior to publication. When a holiday occurs on a deadline Monday, Letters to the Editor must be received no later than noon on the subsequent Tuesday prior to the Friday publication and distribution.
- 4. Letters must bear the writer's name, address and telephone number for verification purposes. The sole use of pen names, initials or the complete omission of a signature will eliminate a letter from consideration from publication. A request from the author to withhold the name or mark the letter anonymous will eliminate the letter from consideration.

  5. All letters are subject to condensa-
- tion or deferral to the next issue by the editor for space considerations, if absolutely necessary. Editor is to so indicate any condensations.
- 6. All letters may not exceed 300 words. Longer letters will be eliminated from consideration for publication in the Village News. As time permits, the writers may be notified and given the opportunity to shorten the letter for future publication. Letters exceeding 300 words which meet all other criteria of this policy may be published on the MVF website.
- 7. The Village News respects the privacy of individuals and residents; letters should not contain references to specific persons, except when endorsing candidates for MVF or Village homes corporation elections or referencing a previously published article with a byline.
- 8. Letters submitted by an author regarding the same topic must present new information or opinions; repetitive submissions and/or form letters submissions will only be printed once.
- 9. The Letters to the Editor section is not a forum for extensive debates; MVF encourages residents to use other avenues such as facebook and twitter for timely discussion.
- 10. All e-mail is subject to this policy. The e-mail subject line must read "Letter to the Editor."
- All e-mail letters must include the writer's full name, address and telephone number for verification.
- As with letters delivered to the MVF office in person or by the U.S. Postal Service, the Montgomery Village News will make every effort to publish all letters received prior to the publication deadline.

## **Montgomery County Drug Take-Back Day**

On Saturday, Oct. 28 between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., community members can drop off unused, unwanted or expired prescription drugs as Montgomery County once again participates in the Washington Division of the Drug Enforcement Administration's (DEA's) National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day.

County law enforcement agencies and the Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services Substance Abuse Prevention Office are co-sponsoring the effort. This is a safe, free and anonymous opportunity to dispose of unused, unwanted or expired prescription drugs and is part of a national effort to prevent the increasing problems of prescription drug abuse and theft that continues to occur nationwide.

Drop-off locations will be open to the general public throughout Montgomery County. These locations will accept prescription drugs and over-the-counter medications only. Liquids, illicit drugs, needles, sharps and syringes cannot be accepted as part of this take-back program. Officers will staff collection boxes in the parking lots in facilities or in facility lobbies convenient for Village residents:

- Montgomery County Police 6<sup>th</sup> District Station, 45A West Watkins Mill Road
- Gaithersburg Police Station, 14 Fulks Corner Avenue
- Asbury Methodist Village
   Lobby of Hefner Building, 417 Russell Avenue
- Senior Living at Kentlands Manor, 217 Booth Street

Residents are encouraged to bring in medications containing controlled substances; officers will accept any medications brought for disposal. All sites will take pills and medication patches of all kinds. If possible, prescription labels should be removed or personal

information should be blacked out; however, pill bottles will still be accepted if the labels are attached. No questions will be asked

This is an opportunity to safely empty out a medicine cabinet of drugs that are no longer needed. Disposing of prescription drugs through a drug take-back day is the safest option. If it is safe to dispose of a drug by flushing it down a toilet, the drug label or prescription information will indicate that option is an appropriate means of disposal. Otherwise unused drugs should not be poured down a sink or flushed for disposal. Drugs should not be thrown in the trash unless specific safety precautions for safe disposal are followed.

The returned medications on Drug Take-Back Day will be incinerated according to federal and state environmental guidelines.

Federal Communications Commission (FCC) statutes and regulations prohibit the county from enacting laws that have the effect of prohibiting wireless service, and require the county to act on applications much more quickly than the current process takes. The focus of the ZTA is on siting the new towers is on existing county rights-of-way.

Private street rights-of-way in Montgomery Village communities will not be subject to the new provisions for siting and approval of small cell towers in the county right-of-way, but would be reviewed according to the zoning provisions applicable for towers on private property.

Telecommunications providers who want to use the private street rights-of-way in Montgomery Village communities would have to first get the approval from the community association that owns the right of way. To put an antenna on an existing pole, such as a street light, the owner of the pole would also have to consent. The standard for the pole would be the limited use standard from the zoning code. To put a new pole in, the telecommunications provider would have to get the permission of the association owning the right of way, and then apply for a conditional use approval per the zoning ordinance.

An additional hurdle for telecommunications providers to overcome in Montgomery Village communities is that the communities have Public Utility Easements (PUE) covering use of the right-of-way. The significant features of a PUE provide that: each time a PUE is established, it is not granted to "utilities" generally, but to specific named utilities. If a company wishing to put up a cell tower is not a named utility in the grant of a PUE, they have no rights under the PUE.

Perhaps more importantly, the PUE has a clear and concise list of the improvements that may be constructed under the PUE. They include: (A) underground power transmission lines and aboveground transmission, switching, fusing and junction equipment; (B) underground communication lines and associated aboveground junction pedestals and terminals; and (C) gas transmission and distribution facilities. In other words, the PUE does not encompass cell towers. Finally, the PUE grants the named utilities the perpetual right to keep the property clear of buildings and structures. Staff will continue to monitor the proposed

#### SHORT TERM RENTAL (AIRBNB) LEGISLATION ADOPTED

After more than a year and a half of review and revision, on October 10, the county council enacted ZTA 17-03 and Bill 2-16 to regulate short-term (less than 30 days) rentals in the county. The laws are in response to emerging patterns of rentals made possible by internet services such as Airbnb.

From the time the bills were introduced, MVF and many other community associations

made the council aware of the potential harms to quality of life in neighborhoods from short-term rentals, including security, noise, and increased competition for parking.

The bills as passed include many provisions that will hopefully mitigate impacts on community associations. These include a requirement to provide a contact person if the owner is not present during the rental; a requirement to be in compliance with community association documents regarding rentals; requirement to notify neighbors that the property will be used for short-term rentals; a requirement to provide one off street parking space for each rental contract; and a limit of six adults as overnight guests per property.

To ensure that properties are not exclusively short-term rentals, owners must certify that the property is their primary residence in order to obtain a license for short-term rentals. An applicant for a license must also certify that he has provided notification of the application to the community association where the property is located. Property owners are encouraged to be present at the property when it is being used for short-term rentals, by a provision in the new law that restricts short-term rental use to no more than 120 days a year the owner is not present.

The new laws take effect in July 2018. The county's Department of Health and Human Services will have the responsibility for enforcement.

# County council approves supplemental appropriation to fight gang activity

On October 3, the Montgomery County Council voted unanimously to support the county executive's supplemental appropriation to the Montgomery County Police Department in the amount of \$596,920, and the State's Attorney's Office in the amount of \$246,773. As chair of the council's Public Safety Committee, Councilmember Marc Elrich says he is grateful that his colleagues understand the importance of increasing funding to address this issue.

The county is taking an important first step to combat gang activity in our community. This funding will address needs on both the investigatory and prosecutorial sides of law enforcement. It's also important that we look for effective programs that can reduce the flow of young children into gangs. This problem cannot be solved through law enforcement efforts alone. We need to address it head on and in a thoughtful, thorough manner. I look forward to further discussions with non-profit service

providers and county staff as we examine what more can be done to address this problem with comprehensive, preventative strategies to supplement the work of our public safety departments," says Elrich.

The approved funding will enable the police department to expand its current Gang Unit with the addition of six new positions, including a sergeant, three detectives and two civilian gang analysts. This will facilitate the expansion of a centralized unit focusing on complex, long-ranging investigations into gang organizations, including enhanced coordination with regional and federal partner agencies. It will also include a unit tasked with working in the field with police districts to respond quickly to suspected gang-related crimes.

The funding also will add three new assistant state's attorneys and one new senior legal assistant to the State's Attorney's Office to create a new gang unit, tasked with monitoring and prosecuting cases linked to gang activity.

# County council passes legislation on short-term rental services

The Montgomery County Council voted unanimously on Tuesday, Oct. 10 to enact two legislative proposals that address the legal and regulatory status of shortterm rentals in the county. The two measures, ZTA 17-03 and Bill 2-16, represent Council Vice President Riemer's and the Montgomery County Planning Board's recommendations to balance the substantial economic potential for county residents of shortterm residential services like Airbnb with concerns about regulating these services.

The measure was initially introduced by Council Vice President Riemer more than a year ago, and was sent to the planning board to gather public input and refine the approach. After a September 12 public hearing and two Planning, Housing, and Economic Development (PHED) Committee meetings to review these measures, the council voted

unanimously (9-0) to adopt both measures.

ZTA 17-03 makes bed and breakfasts limited uses in most residential and mixed-use zones. It limits the total number of adult overnight guests in a shortterm rental to six, limits the total number of adult overnight guests per bedroom to two and requires one off-street parking space for each rental contract. These measures put in place a regulatory framework that did not exist before, addressing concerns about the potential for residential housing to be used exclusively as a shortterm rental service.

ZTA 17-03 was approved with two revisions: (1) the dwelling unit used as a short-term rental must be the property owner's or ownerauthorized resident's primary residence; and (2) if the property owner or ownerauthorized resident is not present in the residence, the property can be used as a

short-term residential rental for a maximum of 120 days in a calendar year.

The council also enacted Bill 2-16, which requires that several conditions be met to receive short-term residential licensing.

Riemer spoke about the importance of these measures which ensure that residents can benefit from short-term rental services while maintaining the security and character of neighborhoods.

"By bringing all the stakeholders together, we were able to find a balance that works for us here in Montgomery County," said Riemer. "This legislation will allow residents and visitors to get the value of home-sharing services, while preventing abuse and stopping investors from creating de facto hotels in residential neighborhoods and taking valuable housing stock off the market."

#### Trash and rodents

Trash and rodents continue to be an ongoing problem in Middle Village. If you are one of the residents who places trash out in plastic trash bags or trash cans without a closed lid, you are contributing to the rodent problem. To get rid of rats and mice, we must starve them and get rid of the food source.

If you see a resident(s) placing trash out in plastic bags or a trash can without a top, call ComSource and report them! There is a \$100 reward for picture or video proof of violations to the trash policy that identifies the violators. Picture or video proof, which includes the address of the violator or other identifying information, is required to collect a reward, and some restrictions apply. All reports will remain anonymous. Residents who place trash out in plastic bags will be fined.

If your trash can is overflowing, purchase an additional trash can with a lid.

We have to cut off the food supply of rodents to get rid of them. If you have bags of trash in your yard, put them in a trash can with a lid. If your neighbors have trash in their yard, report them to ComSource. We are not trying to create an atmosphere where we tell on our neighbors, but we have to eliminate the problem—trash—to get rid of the rats.

#### MISUSE OF THOMAS CHOICE CONDOMINIUMS TENNIS COURTS

A portion of your assessments allows Middle Village residents to utilize the Thomas Choice Condominium tennis courts. There have been reports of residents misusing the courts. Activities such as soccer, skate-boarding, riding scooters, etc. are not allowed. These activities can damage the court surface, which may result an increased assessment due to repair costs. The courts are to be used for tennis only.

#### **SHOPPING CARTS**

Shopping carts are being removed from the neighboring stores in the shopping center and being left in the Middle Village community. Do not remove any shopping carts from the shopping center—it is illegal. If you have shopping carts in your possession, return them to the shopping center.

#### **ASSESSMENTS**

Assessments are due paid monthly. Your payment must be received by ComSource on or before the 15th of the month to avoid late charges. Your regular payment allows us to con-tinue providing services to the community.

Homeowners who are delinquent with their assessment payments must pay their past due balance in full or make arrangements to pay them. The first step to making payment arrangements is calling Delphine Matthews at ComSource at 301-924-7355 or e-mailing dmatthews@comsource.com.

# BULK TRASH PICKUP NO LONGER AVAILABLE

Due the large volume of bulk trash, the cost to have it collected and the fact that bulk trash attracts rodents and lowers the property values, it was decided that residents will now be responsible for disposing of their own bulk trash.

Placing bulk trash in the community is a violation that is subject to a fine. Any resident dumping bulk trash on Middle Village property will be fined \$250.

There is a \$100 reward for picture or video proof that identifies violators of the community trash policy. Picture or video proof is required to collect a reward, and some restrictions apply. All reports will remain anonymous. Homeowners will be fined if they or their tenants violate the trash policy.

Trash policy violations include, but are not limited to:

 Placing trash out in plastic bags instead of a trash receptacle with a lid.

- 2. Trash/recycling out on inappropriate days/non-pickup days.
- 3. Placing trash out on common area spaces instead of in front of home. Trash includes loose trash, bagged trash and trash in cans.

Remember, do not place household trash or recycling out until the evening before pickup or the morning of pickup. Any other time is a violation of the community trash policy and is subject to fines.

Note: If an item does not fit into the blue recycling container, it is not recycling. If an item does not fit into the 35-gallon trashcan previously provided, it is not nor-

mal household trash. If an item is yard waste, it must be in a paper bag or bundled and placed out with recycling pickup.

## 2018 budget and beyond

This article presents an updated analysis of Whetstone's financial situation from the analysis presented in a July "Whetstone Watch" article.

Based on resident feedback, this analysis was adjusted to:

- Remove the snow component from both income and expenses
- Update for board budget actions at the July 2017 meeting
- Update for the results of the 2016 Whetstone audit
- Update the current expenses to date and the projected expenses for the rest of 2017

Each resident has received a ballot asking for an assessment ceiling increase. The requested amount is \$116 per resident (\$29 per quarter or 13% overall). This was the absolute minimum that could be asked for and still maintain a comparable level of maintenance as

Whetstone has not raised its general assessment of \$914 since the 2013 budget year. Typically, general assessment increases need to be done every four to five years – hence 2018 would be the appropriate year to consider a new increase.

Currently the board is considering two budgets for 2018 - one assuming an increase and one that does not.

Without an assessment increase, the board will be required to reduce yearly maintenance spending by roughly 31%. This minimal budget will result in only safety issues being addressed, the minimal maintenance of assets and a very small amount of discretionary improvements. Even with the assessment ceiling increase, overall maintenance spending will only be increased by a modest 5%.

The need for a ceiling increase is simple – inflation and increases in taxes/fees charged by the county.

To which I say balderdash. The association's books are open to everyone and every question asked has been answered. The board understands that no one wants to pay more in assessment; board members pay the same assessment as well and we have no incentive to ask for one more dime than is needed. Ultimately, it is each member's decision on what the community will spend.

## North Village October board meeting

Your board of directors held their October meeting this past Thursday, Oct. 19. This article went to press earlier in the week so we can only discuss what was on the agenda. We will cover the actual meeting in our next article.


There were three items of new business on the agenda: approval of the 2018 budget; setting the assessment for 2018; and appointing the election committee.

A summary of the 2018 draft budget was published in the last issue of the Village News. Since all board members were involved in the development of that budget, it is most likely that the budget was approved at the meeting this past Thursday. The good news is that the board of directors was projecting a lower assessment, the result of reduced security costs when we switched contractors. So, as the board sets the assessment for 2018, residents can expect to pay less in 2018 if the board held to the numbers that were in the draft budget.

The other new business on the agenda was the appointment of the election committee. These individuals will be responsible for the approval of the candidates, preparation of the ballots, counting the ballots when the voting closes and determining the winners. Winners will be announced at the North Village Annual Meeting in February.

#### **LEAF PICKUP**

The last issue of the Village News listed tentative leaf pickup in North Village for the weeks of November 12 and December 17. Several residents are concerned with what they should do with the leaves until then. Obviously, folks can't keep leaves on their lawns until then, and filling up the gutters in the interim isn't a solution. Your HOA will have to pay someone to clean the drains



when the leaves clog the drains and the water backs up. And if you have a landscaper, do not let them put leaves in the gutter until the pickup dates. In the meantime, your board of directors recommends that you bag the leaves and put them out on the curb for the county recycling on their regular service days.

North Village does not have a leaf policy. In fact, none of the associations in Montgomery Village do. Leaves should be raked to the curb only the week of the stated collection. All other times the homeowner is responsible for removal. This means you should bag and recycle them or mulch them with a lawnmower.

#### **CALL FOR CANDIDATES**

Election for your board of directors is fast approaching. Every year we elect three members to the nine-member board. Board members serve for three years. Three incumbent board members are up for election this year. The nominating deadline is Thursday, Nov. 9, so the list of candidates will be completed soon. The election material will be distributed to residents in mid-December, with ballots due in January 2018. If you are interested in volunteering to help your community, please submit your name to our community manager before November 9. Her phone number is given below. You will be asked to submit

a short paragraph describing your background and interest in serving on the board. There is not a big demand on your time with only seven board meetings, normally every other month, except for the annual meeting in February. You will be asked to attend a budget meeting in mid-summer to help prepare the budget for the next year. We need dedicated residents who want to take an active role in managing our homes corporation.

#### **OCTOBER ASSESSMENT DUE**

If you have not done so already, please remember to send in your fourth quarter assessment payment to the Montgomery Village Foundation. Fourth quarter assessments were due on October 1. To avoid late fees, your assessment must be received by the end of the month.

## Volunteers needed for homes corporation boards of directors

Each year, the Village homes corporations seek candidates for election to their boards of directors. Interested residents are invited to submit applications for candidacy to the Nominating Committee of their local homes corporation.

Directors of homes corporations are responsible for setting assessments and managing the maintenance of all open spaces, streets, paths and lights that belong to the individual homes corporation.

Basic qualifications for board membership are time and interest, but whatever other knowledge, training, skills or experience one has will almost certainly be used in some capacity.

1. According to the documents, a candidate is not required to be a resident of Montgomery Village, except in Whetstone Homes Corporation and North Village Homes Corporation, where the candidate is required to be a resident homeowner. However, resident candidates must be in good standing with the Montgomery Village Foundation and their respective homes corporation with regard to covenants and

policies and must be current in all assessment payments. In several cases, the Nominating Committee is given the authority to determine which of the nominees will be on the final slate of candidates.

2. To apply for candidacy, a prepared statement of the applicant's qualifications and interests must be delivered to any member of the Nominating Committee or to the Montgomery Village Foundation Office, 10120 Apple Ridge Road, no later than 5 p.m. on the closing dates stated in the box.

3. A candidate may be solicited or may volunteer. A resident nominating another resident must secure his/her written consent.

4. The number of candidates is unlimited.

5. All nominees will be requested to submit a single page (typewritten, double spaced) statement, which will be reproduced in the December, January or February issue of the *Village News* and will be sent to all voters along with the ballots (standard form will be supplied to board nominees).

6. Also, per a Montgomery County Law, if elected, can-

didates must participate in a Montgomery County Commission on Common Ownership Communities (CCOC)approved board member training class, to be scheduled and completed within 90 days of the start of their term of service.

Ballots will be mailed to the electorate either in December, January or February, depending on the specific corporation's election calendar.

In addition to electing directors, each homes corporation also elects a representative and an alternate representative to the MVF for one-year terms. Suggested names for the position will appear on the ballots.

Each board of directors consists of nine directors who serve three-year terms. The terms are staggered, creating three vacancies every year.

Note: While the word count for candidates' statements varies among homes corporations (check with your community manager), the word count for candidates' statements for the Montgomery Village News must not exceed 200 words per candidate. 

## **MV Kids learn about sound**

Have you ever wondered what makes a noise or sound?

Sounds are actually a type of energy that makes vibrations. When your ear is in range of the vibrations, you hear the sound.

When an object vibrates, it moves the tiny air particles around it. Those particles move too and bump into more and more particles. This movement, called sound waves, keeps going until all the particles run out of energy.

It's kind of like throwing a rock into still water. When the rock hits the water, it makes small waves. Those waves make more and more waves, until there is not enough energy to make any more waves.

#### How to make water chimes

#### **Materials**

8 glasses teaspoons water

#### **Directions**

- Line up eight glasses of about the same size and shape.
- Fill the first glass about 1/8th full of water for the high note, the second glass should be 1/4 full, the third glass should be 3/8th full for the next note and so on.
- Each glass should sound like a note on the music scale (do, re, mi, fa, sol, la, ti, do). You may need to tune your music scale (add or remove water with teaspoon).
- Use a metal teaspoon to gently tap out the scale.

#### Hints for water chimes

- Ask your parents for help when filling and playing the glasses.
- Don't use expensive glasses to make water chimes.
- Add a bit a food coloring to help identify which glass is which sound.
- Changing the amount of water will change the musical note. The amount of water in the glass changes the pitch of the sound wave.

Can you use the notes to play a simple tune?

#### So how do you hear different sounds?

Different sounds are made from different vibrations. Fast vibrations make highpitched sounds, and slow vibrations make low-pitched sounds. If a sound wave repeats its vibrations in a regular pattern, you hear musical notes. If a sound wave repeats its vibrations in an irregular pattern, you hear noise.


Think of a flute. When you blow air into the hole at one end, you start making the air particles vibrate down the inside of the flute. Because the flute is a long straight tube, the sound waves bounce off of each side in a regular pattern making musical notes. When you press the keys of the flute down, the notes change because you increase or decrease the amount of space inside the flute.

With an instrument like a guitar, vibrations start when you pick or strum a string or strings. You can change the amount of space that vibrates by moving your fingers up or down the strings. Just like the space air has to travel inside the flute, this changes the sounds and notes you hear. The thickness of the strings also helps change the sound produced.
