On Thursday, Nov. 10, the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) welcomed new residents to the Village with help from the MVF Board, staff and local vendors and organizations.

The annual program helps provide new residents with an understanding of MVF, the Village in general and what it means to be part of a flourishing planned community. Local business vendors and non-profit organizations from the neighborhood also share their information and experiences in Montgomery Village with those in attendance.

Approximately 75 of the over 400 residents who moved to Montgomery Village in the last year were greeted by

enthusiastic members of the community as they came to share their resident experiences and learn more about our flourishing community. MVF Board President Pete Young welcomed the attendees to the event and started the program by talking about what it means to live in a planned community such as Montgomery Village. Young talked about the responsibilities of the Board of Directors, as well as obligations of residents in a planned community. He stressed the Board's commitment to fiscal responsibility and resident obligations to adhere to community covenants and architectural standards. While

# Retail trends discussed at recent community forum

On November 3, Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) hosted a retail forum to discuss national, regional and local trends in retail development and how these concepts impact potential development in the Village. A panel of retail experts spoke to the 50-plus residents at Lake Marion Community Center and answered their questions about keeping Montgomery Village relevant in the retail market.


MVF Executive Vice President (EVP) Dave Humpton opened the forum giving nod to the members of the former Transportation, Development and Public Facilities Committee, and the Retail Subcommittee whose idea it was to have community discussions regarding retail in Montgomery Village. He said this forum was the first in a series of economic and community development workshops to be neid in the Village. Humpton introduced the panelists: Maureen McAvey, former Senior Fellow of the Urban Land Institute; Tom Lonergan, Director of Economic Development for the City of Gaithersburg; and Iavnie VanGilder, Retail Leasing Director for Atlantic Realty Companies (ARC), the new owner of the Village Center.

McAvey said that on a national level, the retail industry is going through an identity change. More consumers are buying goods online and the need for traditional brick and mortar stores is on the decline. For those establishments seeking a physical store, location is everything, and they will pay top dollar for a prime position. She noted that companies are relying on "big data," or analytics about consumers' shopping habits, to establish where they need to be in the retail market to remain successful. McAvey said that food and specialty food item retailers, as well as retailers that offer an "experience," are the two categories seeing an increase in physical locations.

At the community level, McAvey noted that factors like density, median/disposable income, traffic and ability to maintain an online presence will attract retailers to an area. Her advice to garnering desired retailers was to negotiate and follow the current trend of making a center "walkable."

Lonergan continued the community level discussion, saying that within the City, there are many micro markets. He noted that in Gaithersburg,



# Village Center plans moving forward

Atlantic Realty Companies (ARC) purchased the Village Center in December 2015 and has been very busy planning for the future of the site. On April 21 and June 2, ARC met with the community to share plans and receive comment from residents. Since June 2, county planning staff have been working with ARC to revise the plan so that it keeps with the master plan, new zoning and sound planning and design principles.

Some changes were made to the concept plan following the community meetings, including realignment of the pad sites that front Montgomery Village Avenue. The development of a large green space at the rear of the property would serve residents of the new homes, as well as the larger community for special events. In addition, there was a slight redesign of the extension of Centerway Road through the property to accommodate better traffic flow for vehicles and to improve pedestrian crossings.

Originally, ARC had indicated that they were going to remove Denny's Restaurant to give more visibility to the retail stores in the center. However, the planners insisted that a pad site remain on Montgomery Village Avenue because the zoning requires that buildings be brought up to streets. In addition, the planners required that ARC submit a plan that shows buildings lining the drive aisle in the center, which would allow for future retail development. ARC agreed to this requirement, but given their leasing obligations with major tenants, this future plan is not achievable any time

The current plan calls for an addition of 297 residential units on the property, as well as approximately 150,000 sq. ft. of retail. ARC plans on constructing 212 apartments, 15 townhouses and 70 piggyback townhouses to support the center. The build also includes a decrease of approximately 45,000 sq. ft. of retail than what the center currently supports.

The planning board will hold a public meeting about the Village Center Sketch Plan on Thursday, Dec. 15. More information can be found at, www.montgomery planning.org.

# GOLF COURSE REDEVELOPMENT

Monument Realty hosted a meeting on November 1 to share updated preliminary plans for the golf course redevelopment, which is a further refinement of concept plans previously approved by the MVF Board. The plan is consistent with the Montgomery Village Master Plan that was adopted by the county council earlier this year.

As part of the development review process, the county planning board requires applicants to hold a community meeting and receive comments prior to formal submission of a preliminary plan. Monument is expected to formally submit the preliminary plan to Park and Planning by early December. Monument is awaiting formal approval of the Natural Resources Inventory (NRI) of the entire site before finalizing the plan and submitting it to the planning agency for review.

During the recent meeting, there were various stations that residents could visit and ask questions about from representatives from Monument or their development team, which included experts on transportation, environment and plan design. Monument recorded comments at the various stations and responded to many resident questions on the spot.

Questions included whether or not commercial vehicles would be allowed to be parked on the new private streets within the subdivision or on county roads, such as the extension of Stewartown Road; the phasing of construction; traffic control at various intersections and need for new crosswalks, such as at the intersection of Montgomery Village Avenue and Stewartown Road; and the number of moderately priced dwelling units (MPDUs).

The preliminary plan includes 467 homes, most of which are townhouses of various sizes, and approximately 65 acres of passive and active recreation space, including a new park that will be owned by MVF. An apartment building and piggyback townhouse proposals were removed from the concept plan, and townhouses were substituted. The park is proposed to include a dog park, community gardens, a play structure and a parking area.

Once the preliminary plan is submitted in December, review by the planning staff could take several months, and it is anticipated that the planning board will hold a public meeting on the preliminary plan sometime next spring. If everything goes as planned, Monument will begin work very soon on the site plan, which is a much more detailed plan than the preliminary plan, and it is anticipated that they will submit the site plan to the planners by late 2017. # Lake Whetstone Outfall Tower update

Mobilization for the county's Lake Whetstone Outfall Tower project began this week with installation of safety fencing around the lake, having a crane put the barge in the lake and other safety measures. The contractor will be using the Whetstone Homes Corporation side of the lake for staging. They will begin lowering the lake next week, with the goal of having the lake lowered to the elevation needed for the repairs to be made by Thursday, Dec. 1.

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

retail is healthy, but constantly evolving; for example, the current job centers support the retail, especially in areas like the Kentlands. Building on McAvey's points, he said that the 355 corridor has plenty of traffic, but not a lot of room to expand. The result of this combination is mid-market retail establishments - not high end, but useful and affordable retail accessible by local and drive-through traffic. Lonegran noted that the current retail centers complement each other and build on their strengths.

Lonegran also addressed the decline of the retail stores at Lakeforest Mall (not the anchor stores). He said that many of the leases for the interior stores are coming up, and the City is not seeking to purchase the property. In fact, he said that having the property sold at foreclosure may be an advantageous way to foster change in that area. He also said the property needs to be rezoned to accommodate the needs of today's consumers; a lot could happen on the 100-acre site.

VanGilder gave a nod to the history of The Village Center, relating stories of when she visited the center in its hayday. While she was surprised to see the current state of the center, she said that ARC President David Ross has outlined a great vision to bring the center to the next level. Through

ARC's unique connection with retailers, they are looking to turn this center around and make it an important hub in the middle of Montgomery Village once again.

She said that bringing an established grocery store to the Village Center is paramount on their list. "A good grocer is the key to a good neighborhood center," VanGilder said. ARC's plan also calls for a new façade; to right-size some of the current retailers; redo the pad sites in the parking lot of the center; fix the traffic flow by extending some of the roads through the center; and add pedestrian traffic through incorporation of residential units on the property. Her colleague

Matt Copeland of CBRE added that ARC was looking to bring brands that residents wanted to the center, such as Starbucks, as well as food/fast-casual dining establishments with outdoor seating. He noted that about 90% of the current retailers in the center were expected to stay.

Questions from the audience addressed concerns and support, asking how residents can help foster change in the retail landscape, in particular at the Village Center. The panel, along with EVP Humpton, agreed that change is happening in the Village, but it takes some time. For years, the MVF Board of Directors has been planning for the future,

addressing issues with aging infrastructure, and some of those plans are starting to come to fruition. VanGilder noted that the Village Center would be neighborhood-oriented, but to make it successful, ARC is addressing density and transportation hurdles on the site. Pending plan review and approvals, as well as lease timing with current stores, VanGilder estimated a fall 2017 start to some changes at the center.



# The 2016 White House Christmas Ornament

# A LITTLE HISTORY ABOUT THIS YEAR'S ORNAMENT

The 2016 White House Christmas ornament honors the administration of Herbert Hoover, who served as the 31st President of the United States from 1929 to 1933. It is inspired by the fire engines that responded to the 1929 Christmas Eve fire at the White House and the toy trucks presented to children by the Hoovers the following Christmas. The ornament is crafted from shiny brass plated with nickel and 24-karat gold, and the engine carries a Christmas tree for delivery to the White House.

On December 24, 1929, the White House was filled with Christmas cheer when traditional festivities got underway. President and Mrs. Herbert Hoover were entertaining their staff and their children at the party while the Marine Band played carols. The drama began when Chief Usher Ike Hoover whispered to the president, "The executive office is on fire!" President Hoover rose from the dinner table and asked the men to follow him to the West Wing. The men proceeded to rescue as many of the president's papers as time allowed, while First Lady Lou Hoover, informed of the blaze, calmly supervised the party.

The four-alarm fire brought 19 engine companies and four truck companies to the White House. One hundred thirty firefighters began to battle the blaze. The bitter cold temperatures froze some of the hoses. By about 10:30 p.m., the fire was extinguished. Fire Chief George Watson reported that excessive heat from a blocked chimney flue or defective electric wiring had caused pamphlets stored in the attic to ignite, and fire had spread quickly. Congress would soon pass a special appropriation to rebuild the uninsured office wing. The Charles H. Tompkins Company of Washington, D.C., completed the work, and Hoover and his aides moved back into the remodeled West Wing on April 14, 1930.

- Previous participation in community affairs
- Academic, professional, or practical experience in such areas as finance, engineering, administration or law, which would assist in the management of a community association Of course, a candidate must be in good standing with MVF and not in sustained violation of any MVF covenant, architectural standard or rule, and current in assessments.
- 18 years of age or above

### **HOW DO I RUN FOR THE MVF BOARD?**

It's easy. Candidates do not need to run an expensive political campaign to serve the community. Space is set aside in the *Village News* for candidate statements, along with photos, so Villagers can get to know the candidates and their views. Also, the MVF Election Committee sponsors a Candidates' Forum and two "Meet the Candidates" events where candidates can talk with Villagers one-on-one about issues of importance. # Criteria for nominating directors to the Patton Ridge Homes Corporation

- 1. All candidates must be in good standing with the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) and the Patton Ridge Homes Corporation. In addition, resident candidates must not be in violation of By-laws and Covenants, and must also be current in their payments of dues and assessments to both MVF and the Patton Ridge Homes Corporation.
- 2. To become a candidate for nomination, one must prepare a written statement of qualifications, interests and reasons for candidacy. This statement must be delivered to any member of the nominating committee or to the MVF Office no later than 5 p.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 30
- 3. An individual nominating another person must obtain the candidate's written consent, along with a statement of qualifications, interests and reasons for candidacy, prior to the submission of the name to the committee.
- 4. The nominating committee will consider all candidates who meet the above criteria. Nominees shall be selected from among the candidates on the basis of a number of factors including, but not limited to, the following:
- a. Extent of previous participation in community activities (both within and outside Montgomery Village).
- b. Consideration for an equitable geographic repre-

- sentation on the board (i.e. representation from each section within the homes corporation).
- c. Professional or other qualifications related to the fields of fiscal management and property maintenance.
- 5. All nominees are required to submit a single page (type written, double spaced) summary statement of no more than 150 words for publication in the Friday, Dec. 16 edition of the Village News. The summary statement and the statement of qualifications may in fact be the same document. Ballots along with the summary statements will be mailed to the electorate by Tuesday, Dec. 13. Standard candidate forms will be supplied to all nominating committee members by MVF
- 6. The nominating committee shall also select at least one candidate for each of the positions of Representative and Alternate Representative to MVF. The names selected will also appear on the ballots.
- 7. All potential candidates, if elected to the board, agree to complete the Montgomery County required electronic board training immediately after being elected.

### North Village November board meeting

by the North Village Board of Directors

The regular meeting of the North Village Board of Directors was held Thursday, Nov. 17. Since this article had to go to press on Monday we were unable to cover news of the meeting. Look for full coverage of the meeting in our next article, which will appear on Friday, Dec. 2.

The most important item on the agenda was the approval of the 2017 North Village budget. A summary of the budget was published in the October 7 issue of the *Village News*. Once the budget is published, the board allows 30 days for residents to comment on the budget. Since the 30 days had expired, the board was scheduled to vote on the budget at their meeting on Thursday.

Other items on the agenda included the review of bids on two important contracts: the landscaping contract and the audit contract. This year we decided to go out for more bids for landscaping to see if we can obtain better service for a similar amount of money. At \$100,000, landscaping is the largest single line item in our budget and represents almost half of all maintenance expenditures.

We are seeking another audit firm to review the corporation books, not because we are dissatisfied with the current auditor whom we have had for more than five years, but because it is good financial practice to periodically have a new set of experts looking over our books.

Also on the agenda was preparation for our yearly board elections, which will take place in December and January. The election calendar was approved at the August meeting. The calendar calls for approval of the election material and selection of candidates at the November board meeting. Election material will be mailed to residents the week of December 13, and ballots are due back by 5 p.m. on Thursday, Jan. 19, 2017, which is the date of the next board meeting.

Three seats on the nine member board are up for election each year. The incumbents are expected to run again for their seats, but that should not stop anyone from volunteering to be a candidate. In fact, the board has been operating with one vacant seat. This means that anyone who wants to run will have a good chance of being selected. Even though time is running out, you still have time to submit your name to our community manager whose name and contact information is listed at the end of this article.

### **MAINTENANCE**

The 2016 tree work is scheduled to be completed next week by our contractor, Elliot Tree Service. The maintenance committee performed an inspection in September and marked another 14 trees for removal in 2017.

The installation of the replacement fence in Picton was to have begun this past week. This is the long fence that separates Picton from the Pepco

property. It is over 30 years old and is showing signs of age.

At this week's meeting, the board was scheduled to review two proposals for solving a persistent storm water run-off problem that was identified some time ago.

Our landscaping contractor is continuing with the leaf removal throughout North Village. The exact dates of the leaf removal are posted at the community entrances. We found that such posting is much more timely and reliable than publishing dates in the *Village News*, which must go to press one week before publication.

When leaves are piled in the gutter for long periods of time, there is a risk that our storm drains will be clogged. In that regard it is really better to keep the leaves on the lawn edge than in the streets, where they can clog the drains. However, driving through the neighborhood last weekend, we saw that all the piles are in the street.

### **NOVEMBER UPDATE**

At the November meeting, the board approved the FY2017 budget, which includes a \$1.00 per quarter increase. Also approved: \$19,500 for pruning of street trees in Williams Range; \$1,660 for pruning five oak trees in the Williams Range park area; \$1,580 to remove two Ash trees in the Williams Range park area; \$1,175 to remove a substantial oak on

Darlington Drive; and \$3,500 to remove four large pines on Maple Leaf Drive.

Leaf removal should be completed by the time you read this. An additional pickup will be scheduled in December. Stay tuned.

# Volunteers needed for homes corporation boards of directors

Each year, the Village homes corporations seek candidates for election to their boards of directors. Interested residents are invited to submit applications for candidacy to the Nominating Committee of their local homes corporation.

Directors of homes corporations are responsible for setting assessments and managing the maintenance of all open spaces, streets, paths and lights that belong to the individual homes corporation.

Basic qualifications for board membership are time and interest, but whatever other knowledge, training, skills or experience one has will almost certainly be used in some capacity.

- 1. According to the documents, a candidate is not required to be a resident of Montgomery Village, except in Whetstone Homes Corporation and North Village Homes Corporation, where the candidate is required to be a resident homeowner. However, resident candidates must be in good standing with the Montgomery Village Foundation and their respective homes corporation with regard to covenants and policies and must be current in all assessment payments. In several cases, the Nominating Committee is given the authority to determine which of the nominees will be on the final slate of candidates.
- 2. To apply for candidacy, a prepared statement of the applicant's qualifications and interests must be delivered to any member of the Nominating Committee or to the Montgomery Village Foundation Office, 10120 Apple Ridge Road, no later than 5 p.m. on the closing dates stated in the box.
- 3. A candidate may be solicited or may volunteer. A resident nominating another resident must secure his/her written consent.

- 4. The number of candidates is unlimited.
- 5. All nominees will be requested to submit a single page (typewritten, double spaced) statement, which will be reproduced in the December, January or February issue of the *Village News* and will be sent to all voters along with the ballots (standard form will be supplied to board nominees).
- 6. Also, per a new Montgomery County Law, effective January 1, 2016, if elected, candidates must participate in a Montgomery County Commission on Common Ownership Communities (CCOC)-approved board member training class, to be scheduled and completed within 90 days of the start of their term of service.

Ballots will be mailed to the electorate either in December, January or February, depending on the specific corporation's election calendar.

In addition to electing directors, each homes corporation also elects a representative and an alternate representative to the MVF for one-year terms. Suggested names for the position will appear on the ballots.

Each board of directors consists of nine directors who serve three-year terms. The terms are staggered, creating three vacancies every year.

Note: While the word count for candidates' statements varies among homes corporations (check with your community manager), the word count for candidates' statements for the Montgomery Village News must not exceed 200 words per candidate. # Network Operations students to donate a computer lab

The Montgomery County Students Information Technology Foundation, Inc. (ITF) Network Operations program held its annual computer lab gifting ceremony on Thursday, Nov. 17 at Clarksburg High School.

The Adventist Community Services of Greater Washington, Inc. (ACSGW), based in Silver Spring, was this year's computer lab recipient. The ACSGW is a unique establishment within Montgomery County whose goal is to help youth (ages 17 to 25) acquire computer repair skills and knowledge to earn CompTIA A+ certification. By providing youth the opportunity to attain such a foundational skillset in the informational technology (IT) field, students will have better career opportunities available to them. It is the hope of the ACSGW that by the end of the program, students' IT skills and experiences will enable them to acquire an entry level IT job or become a computer service technician.

The goal of ACSGW is to train as many youths as possible in the IT field. Currently, ACSGW has a lab with 15 computers, with almost half of the lab in disrepair. Additionally, the ACSGW holds IT trainings

12 times a week with approximately 75 participants. With the donation of the computer lab from the ITF, the ACSGW plans to revitalize their current computer lab in order to allow more student participation and utilize newer technology.

ITF students at Clarksburg High School reconditioned six computers with operating systems, monitors, keyboards, mice and a printer for the lab. This project provides an opportunity for the ITF students to put into practice their computer maintenance skills, earn student service learning hours and develop a deeper appreciation for charity and community involvement.

The ITF is a non-profit organization established cooperatively by the Montgomery County business community and Montgomery County Public Schools. It provides a unique method of hands-on training for high school students to earn valuable computer certifications that will prepare them for higher education opportunities or direct entry into the information technology job market. 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# MV Kids Learn About Thanksgiving —


In 1621, colonists from Plymouth, England and Native American Wampanoag Indians shared a three-day autumn harvest festival that is acknowledged today as one of the first Thanksgiving



celebrations in the colonies. But it wasn't until 1863 (242 years later), in the middle of the Civil War, that President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day to be held each November.

### **The Mayflower**

The small ship called the Mayflower left Plymouth, England, carrying 102 passengers—some were religious separatists looking for a new home where they could freely practice their faith and others who wanted success and land ownership in the New World. It took 66 days to cross the Atlantic in uncomfortable and dangerous conditions. They sailed into Cape Cod and stayed there for one month before crossing Massachusetts Bay, where the Pilgrims, as they are now commonly known, began the work of making a village at Plymouth, Mass.



Throughout that first brutal winter, most of the colonists remained on board the ship, where they suffered from exposure, scurvy and outbreaks of contagious disease. Only half of the Mayflower's original passengers and crew lived to see their first New England spring.

### **Become a Master Gardener**

Montgomery County residents interested in learning environmentally sound gardening practices and sharing the information with others can apply now to join the 2017 Montgomery County Master Gardener volunteer training program.

The course runs from Friday, Jan. 24, 2017 through Friday, March 10, 2017 (depending on possible snow days). Classes meet Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the University of Maryland Extension, Montgomery County Office, 18410 Muncaster Road, Derwood. The training fee is \$325 and includes a training manual and other materials. Faculty and staff of the University of Maryland Extension, as well as other experts in the green industry, present horticulture lectures that cover such topics as ornamental plants, fruits, vegetables and herbs; identifying common pests and diseases; and proper fertilization and watering practices.

"The class provides a great opportunity for home gardeners as well as those in the green industry to increase their knowledge," said Steve Dubik, Extension Horticulture Consultant and county Master Gardener Coordinator.

The non-profit program falls under the auspices of Montgomery County government and the University of Maryland College of Agriculture and Natural Resources. It is open to all regardless of race, color, gender, disability, religion, age, sexual orientation, marital or parental status or national origin.

The requirements to become a Master Gardener are: attendance at a mandatory,

two-hour orientation; completion of course work and a final exam; and performance of 45 voluntary service hours in the first year. Participants should have access to the internet.

Once qualified, Master Gardeners maintain active status by completing 10 hours of advanced training annually and 25 hours of volunteer service annually. Volunteer activities include maintaining demonstration gardens, assisting at plant clinics, speaking to community groups and providing therapeutic horticulture to residents of nursing homes and special needs students.

Registration deadline is Friday, Dec. 30. Class size is limited and filled on a first-come, first-served basis. To request an application, or for more information, call 301-590-2836.

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


