
RECREATION COMMITTEE

Apple Ridge Pool renovation update

Renovation work continues to progress on the Apple Ridge Pool. The contractor is in the process of finishing the

three stormwater management facilities on the site, as well as finishing the pool plumbing and pipework.

In the next few weeks, the stone underlayment will be placed within pool area (pre-concrete), with concrete work estimated to be completed by the end of the month (weather permitting). Plumbing work in the bath house has also been started.

The contractor will be finishing as much outdoor work as possible done before colder weather sets in. When outside work slow for weather, the interior bath house work will be in full swing.

Letters to Editor



This past summer we witnessed the destruction of several large White Pine (Pinus Strobus) trees in Montgomery Village. Reportedly, these trees had become a maintenance problem near the MVF swimming pools, and were "near the end of their lifespan." A similar reason was provided to one of the local HOAs by their landscape maintenance contractor, who then was paid thousands of dollars to cut the trees down. Sadly for both our residents and the trees, the rationale is totally false.

According to the U.S. Forest Service (www.fs.fed.us/database) and the Department of Forest Resources and Environmental Conservation at Virginia Tech, White Pine trees have an average lifespan of 200 years, and can often live to nearly 400 years of age. The Kettler Brothers planted thousands of White Pine trees in Montgomery Village, and most are at their full height now and thriving. The reality is that our

HOA budgets cannot afford to spend millions of dollars cutting them down, especially if they are just 20 years old in "people years." This event does highlight the need for having a certified arborist available on the contracted maintenance teams and MVF staff; more careful maintenance to prevent disease; a rule that the HOA contractor will not benefit from any tree removal expenses; and maybe a bonus payment if tree service expenses are avoided or go down.

The decision by MVF also reportedly included concern that the lifeguards had to skim the pine needs off the trees in the morning after a storm. This seems a minor inconvenience for staff that was there anyway, and preserved beautiful healthy trees that shaded our residents and children on the pool decks for many years. Now those trees need to be replaced, and White Pines are a good choice as they grow rapidly and provide good shade. Ironically, the National Arbor

Foundation gave MVF a "Tree City" designation the same month that MVF was cutting down these beloved pine trees. I hope we can actually deserve the designation from now on.

Editor's Note:

MVF recognizes Mr. Lechner's concerns; however MVF and the homes corporations evaluate trees and landscape plans on a regular basis to determine when trees should be trimmed or removed. Oftentimes, safety is going to trump the aesthetic value of a tree. Every situation is a little different, and although the overall goal is not to remove trees, difficult judgments must be made on a regular basis. Both entities spend thousands of dollars to replace trees and have worked with county government programs to enhance the tree canopy of Montgomery Village. MVF cherishes its Tree City designation!

Editor:

On October 14 I requested the Whetstone Community Manager to make the following correction to the September 29 Whetstone Board meeting minutes in section 6.f. Review Tax Exempt Status, "The discussion of Mr. Clark's report is incomplete. It was only summarized and did not provide the numeric content on the three components of lost income. Please include a full report on the costs including the probable increase in assessments." I repeated the request at the November 10 Whetstone Board meeting.

My comments to the September 29 Whetstone Board meeting minutes related to the Tax Exempt Status Value finally made their appearance on the Whetstone web page.

On the Tax Exempt status value, the minutes now state, "The exemption is impossible to calculate because Whetstone is not required to prepare the necessary forms." Then it goes on to actually compute the impossible calculation for last

year's Tax Exempt value as \$29 per household per year or \$7.25 per quarter.

In the minutes, this last year's Tax Exempt value is used as the Total Value of Exemption (TVE) Cost Per Year (Low) = \$29.

The minutes also show a Total Value of Exemption (TVE) Cost Per Year (High) = \$90.

This \$90 TVE High value is a manufactured calculation reaching back into history to cherry pick the highest tax credit value ever received and looking to the future in selecting an arbitrary goal of \$50,000 for the amount of interest received per year.

This TVE High value is Voodoo Economics. To establish a legitimate range of values to guide its thinking on the Tax Exempt Value, I urge the Whetstone Board to use the actual tax credit received for each year for the past five years without cherry picking from the past and future.


Service Learning hours and develop a deeper appreciation for community involvement. By coming out, patrons will support our students and help to enhance their sales skills.


A LITTLE HISTORY ABOUT THIS YEAR'S ORNAMENT

The 2016 White House Christmas ornament honors the administration of Herbert Hoover, who served as the 31st President of the United States from 1929 to 1933. It is inspired by the fire engines that responded to the 1929 Christmas Eve fire at the White House and the toy trucks presented to children by the Hoovers the following Christmas. The ornament is crafted from shiny brass plated with nickel and 24-karat gold, and the engine carries a Christmas tree for delivery to the White House.

On December 24, 1929, the White House was filled with Christmas cheer when traditional festivities got underway. President and Mrs. Herbert Hoover were entertaining their staff and their children at the party while the Marine Band played carols. The drama began when Chief Usher Ike Hoover whispered to the president, "The executive office is on fire!" President Hoover rose from the dinner table and asked the men to follow him to the West Wing. The men proceeded to rescue as many of the president's papers as time allowed, while First Lady Lou Hoover, informed of the blaze, calmly supervised the party

The four-alarm fire brought 19 engine companies and four truck companies to the White House. One hundred thirty firefighters began to battle the blaze. The bitter cold temperatures froze some of the hoses. By about 10:30 p.m., the fire was extinguished. Fire Chief George Watson reported that excessive heat from a blocked chimney flue or defective electric wiring had caused pamphlets stored in the attic to ignite, and fire had spread quickly. Congress would soon pass a special appropriation to rebuild the uninsured office wing. The Charles H. Tompkins Company of Washington, D.C., completed the work, and Hoover and his aides moved back into the remodeled West Wing on April 14, 1930.

Unfortunately, this season also presents opportunities for some in our community to take advantage of us. As the temperature drops, one of the first crimes we see an increase in is auto theft. This is because in an effort to stay warm, people will start their cars and leave them running. This creates an easy opportunity for criminals to get a free mode of transportation with very little effort.

We are seeing an increase in stolen vehicle cases in general where owners are leaving a set of keys in unlocked cars, which our young people are exploiting. Juveniles who go out at night checking for unlocked car doors are finding not only your iPad, loose change and garage door opener, they are also finding your car keys and going for a ride. We have ar-

rested one juvenile in the last 45 days for five separate thefts from vehicles and three auto theft cases. Please do not be a victim; lock it up! If you don't think it can happen to you, know that I recently caught a person on my security camera checking the doors on my personal vehicles, with a marked police car in the driveway.

Also remember that the holiday season creates opportunities for thefts at malls and packages from your porch. Be vigilant. Lock purchases in your trunk and find ways to avoid having packages sit on your porch all day when you're at work.

The next immediate thought of this season is the increase in social events, which unquestionably leads to an increase in impaired drivers. It only takes a second for a tragic drunk driving event to occur. In 2015, we lost Officer Noah Leotta to a drunk driving incident, and just last week we had another officer's vehicle struck by a drunk driver while the officer was assisting with a broken down vehicle. Over 100 people are killed each year in Mary-

land due to drunk drivers, in addition to numerous crashes with serious consequences. There are many options to avoid driving drunk, including taxis, Uber, sober ride programs, designated drivers and of course, just not drinking if you are going to drive. Our patrol officers and the Holiday Alcohol Task Force is deployed and making arrests every night. Don't get a free ride to the station!

Holidays should be about people coming together. Now more than ever, the Montgomery County Police Department is strengthening our relationships with the community. We welcome opportunities to work with you and your communities to include neighborhoods, school groups, faith based organizations, the commercial sector and more-together we are stronger. 
Village Center Redevelopment

Atlantic Realty Companies (ARC) purchased the Village Center in December 2015 and has been very busy planning for the future of the site. On April 21 and June 2, ARC met with the community to share plans

and receive comment from residents. Since June 2, county planning staff have been working with ARC to revise the plan so that it keeps with the master plan, new zoning and sound planning and design principles. Some changes were made to the concept plan following the community meetings, including realignment of the pad sites that front Montgomery Village Avenue. The development of a large green space at the rear of the property would serve residents of the new homes, as well as the larger community for special events. In addition, there was a slight redesign of the extension of Centerway Road through the property

to accommodate better traffic flow for vehicles and to improve pedestrian crossings. Originally, ARC had indi-



cated that they were going to remove Denny's Restaurant to give more visibility to the retail stores in the center. However, the planners insisted that a pad site remain on Montgomery Village Avenue because the zoning requires that buildings be brought up to streets. In addition, the planners required that ARC submit a plan that shows buildings lining the drive aisle in the center, which would allow for future retail development. ARC agreed to

this requirement, but given their leasing obligations with major tenants, this future plan is not achievable any time soon. The current plan calls for an addition of 297 residential units on the property, as well as approximately 165,000 sq. ft. of retail. ARC plans on constructing 212 apartments, 15 townhouses and 70 piggyback townhouses to support the

The planning board will hold a public meeting about the Village Center Sketch Plan on Thursday, Dec. 15. More information can be found at, www.montgomeryplanning.org.



Lake Whetstone outfall tower repair update

The county is making progress on the repair to the Lake Whetstone outfall tower. The lake is in the process of being lowered a few inches each day with a siphoning technique, with the full lowered level expected to be achieved in the coming weeks.

The contractor has removed the sluice gate for repair and has currently installed a steel plate on the outside of the tower to prevent water from entering the structure. The trash rack has been removed and sent out for repair and recoating.

Once the lake is lowered the full 3 to 4-foot depth, the top of the outfall tower will be removed and replaced.

The work area has been blocked off with fencing. Residents are reminded to stay clear of the fence and the work area during the repair.

The Nominating Committee reviews all applications for nomination and considers applicants based on a number of factors including, but not limited to the following:

- Status as residential property owner or resident
- Length of residency in Montgomery Village
- Previous participation in community affairs
- Academic, professional, or practical experience in such areas as finance, engineering, administration or law, which would assist in the management of a community association Of course, a candidate must be in good standing with MVF and not in sustained violation of any MVF covenant, architectural standard or rule, and current in assessments
- 18 years of age or above

HOW DO I RUN FOR THE MVF BOARD?

It's easy. Candidates do not need to run an expensive political campaign to serve the community. Space is set aside in the *Village News* for candidate statements, along with photos, so Villagers can get to know the candidates and their views. Also, the MVF Election Committee sponsors a Candidates' Forum and two "Meet the Candidates" events where candidates can talk with Villagers one-on-one about issues of importance. Applicants are provided equal opportunities through the *Village News*, the Meet the Candidates events, and specially prepared Candidate Statements which are forwarded to all Village homeowners with their ballots.

Traditional style homes

A traditional style house is one that will stand the test of time. The traditional style is based on historical roots and is not contemporary or trendy, but rather functional, practical and classical. It is the most popular housing style in the United States. The traditional style house is a mix of many classic simple designs typical of the country's many regions.

Common features of the traditional style house are little ornamentation, simple roof lines, centered front doors, symmetrically spaced windows and a central or side chimney. Floor plans are usually basic, yet flexible, and are designed to embrace family life.

The exterior façade of the traditional house is generally constructed of brick, wood, stone or stucco. Many houses are constructed entirely of brick while others are a combination of materials.

Many traditional homes are found in the communities of Montgomery Village. Single-family traditional style homes are found in Hickory Grove, The Meadows and Kings Point in Eastgate; and Ashford, The Downs, The Estates, The Estates 7B, Gablefield, Meadowgate and Wethersfield in East Village. They are also in Apple Ridge and William's Range in Northgate; and in Pleasant Ridge and Salem's Grant in North Village. Traditional style

homes are located in Fairidge of Patton Ridge; Poplar Spring; and The Ridges of Stedwick, as well as Goshenside, Lakeside and The Ridges of Whetstone.


Traditional style townhouses are also found in Montgomery Village in many communities such as Ridgefield, The Mews and Wood Edge in Eastgate. They are also located in Essex Place I, Holly Pointe and The Reach in East Village; as well as Essex Place II in North Village; and Fairway Islands, Greentee I and II and Partridge Place of Patton Ridge. Traditional style townhouses are also in the community of Frenchton Place in Stedwick.

Snow, tree pruning and beauty

December is just around the corner, and with January just a month away, we will soon have to worry about snow. Hopefully we will not have a repeat of the nightmare snow earlier this year. That nightmare (plus the smaller snows) cost us \$105,062 or \$235 per residence. As you may recall, snow removal is not a budgeted expense; it is a pass-through expense: in the year following the expense, residents are billed for the expense. So brace yourself for the hit in your 2017 association assessment. In 2017 each household will have to pay the \$235. However, since the 2016 assessment included \$110 for snow removal, the actual snow increase over 2016 will be \$125.

On the plus side, snow removal in Whetstone during the nightmare snow was quite prompt. Some neighborhoods plowed by the county had to wait two or more days before their streets were passable. This coming winter, our snow removal will be done by the JB Kline Company. Our prior experience with Kline leads us to expect excellent snow removal service at a slightly reduced cost.

At this time of year, the maintenance committee can see how well the year has gone regarding staying within the budget. In general it has been a good year budget-wise. The

glaring exception, however, is tree pruning. The 2016 budget for tree pruning is \$25,000. But the bids we received were substantially higher than in prior years (some in the \$60,000 range). We ultimately entered a contract costing \$40,000. And this price was achieved primarily by reducing the planned scope of the pruning: a few streets that we expected to be pruned this year had to be deferred to 2017. This, of course, made some residents unhappy. You may be interested to know, however, that two board members and a former board member live on a street that was deferred.

On a happier note, I recently advertised an item on Craigslist. A young man from Derwood purchased the item, and when he came to the house, he remarked that he did not know such a lovely community existed in the area. The leaves were turning, but still on the trees at the time, and I have to believe he was impressed by the trees and greenspace as much as the homes. Anywhere you go in Montgomery County, the trend appears to be greater density and less greenspace. Certainly the watchword for the Village Shopping Center redevelopment and Professional Center redevelopment is high density. Whetstone has more greenspace per residence than any other Village community. That is one reason that our homeowner's assessment is somewhat higher than other communities. But as the county slides down the slippery slope of ever greater density, Whetstone may well be perceived as a green oasis. Yes we pay a lot for tree pruning and replacement, and yes we pay a little more for greenspace upkeep. But we get beauty in return—beauty that will be increasingly admired by those who live in the ever expanding high density areas.

By the way, having contractors water newly planted trees or other plants is expensive, and for budgetary reasons, we do not contract for as much water as would be desirable. If there is a new tree on your property, you could aid the survival of the tree by watering it once a week—even in the late fall.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS CONTEST

Whetstone will, once again, hold a holiday lights decorating contest. Awards will be given for Most Traditional, Most Kid Friendly, Over the Top and Street with Most Holiday Spirit. Judging will take place the week of December 19. The winners will be announced in early January.

Trash pickup in The Points and Overlea is on Mondays and Thursdays. Every other subdivision has pickups on Tuesdays and Fridays. Both regular and bulk trash should be placed out the evening before pickup.

TOT LOTS

As the last neighborhood in Stedwick to be built and one with very little useable greenspace, Kettler Brothers provided three tot lots in the Forest Brooke community. Over the years, pieces of the playground equipment originally installed had to be removed for safety reasons. Twenty-plus years under the sun caused cracking in slides that were no longer useable, and some swing seats can no longer be replaced – all the tot lots are skeletons of their original structures. The first tot lot to be upgraded is on Wild Apple Circle and it is our goal to have the new equipment installed and in use by the beginning of summer. After a thorough study of the equipment available and with help from the Montgomery Village Foundation Department of Recreation, Parks and Culture, we will soon be going out for bids for equipment and installation costs.

RETAINING WALLS

Building on hilly terrain often requires retaining walls to ensure the movement of earth caused by rain; water runoff; the weight of buildings; and that the natural upheaval of the earth does not damage said buildings. The Forest Brooke neighborhood has seven retaining walls, and over the years several have been replaced. It's now time to replace the retaining wall located on the spur of Royal Woods Court. Our landscape and maintenance contractor is in the process of obtaining engineering drawings, having utility lines marked, etc. This project is weather dependent, so residents will be notified when the work will begin. At present, the plan is to start the work in December, but it may continue into January.

TREES GALORE – WE WISH WE HAD MORE

As noted in the last "Stedwick Signals," the trees provided to our community by Montgomery County have been planted. The Montgomery Tree program's objective was to consider not only the present time, but where these trees would provide shade 30 years hence. The greenspace committee was invited to recommend specific areas for planting and species for new trees, but in the end, the final decisions lay with the county. These trees represent a boon for the community and will be maintained by Montgomery County for the next 2 years, saving Stedwick not only the cost of the trees, but the ongoing maintenance.

THE TREE MONTGOMERY CRITERIA

- Town houses are best option as they generally have more asphalt and the goal of the program is to provide shade.
- Minimum space requirement for large, mature tree is 400 square feet.
- Trees need to be planted at least 40 feet from power lines or towers.
- Big trees give the most "bang for the buck" in that they shade roofs, as well as asphalt, and ensure the neighborhood will have big trees in the future enhancing property values.
- The Montgomery Tree program is available to all residents of the county. Currently the program is fully booked, but will be available in the future to those who apply.

Pruning of all community trees is scheduled on a rotating basis and the following neighborhoods will be completed this year: Clusters III, Forest Brooke, The Ridges and The Heights.

The first leaf removal took place the week of November 14, and the second community-wide pickup is scheduled for Monday, Dec. 5 through Friday, Dec. 9.

PEPCO

Frenchton Place was built in the early 1970s and thus has aging infrastructure in need of work. Pepco is currently rewiring throughout the community which involves tunneling under streets and land.

TOWING

The current Middle Village Parking Policy states:

"All vehicles parked overnight in the community are required to display a MVHC parking tag/permit or they are subject to immediate towing. For purposes of these Rules, overnight is defined as parking a vehicle in Middle Village anytime between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m."

"Parking tag/permit must be clearly/properly displayed, on the driver's side, facing the front windshield, on vehicles parked in a reserved parking space, or parked in the community overnight. Tags/permits can be hung from the rear view mirror or taped to the driver's side dashboard or front windshield, front side facing toward the windshield."

"Failure to properly display the current year's parking tag/ permit will lead to immediate towing—even if vehicle is parked in the appropriate reserved parking space. No warnings or notifications will be issued."

The parking policy is available to view on the ComSource website at www.comsource.com.

BULK TRASH COLLECTION AVAILABLE ONCE A WEEK

Potomac Disposal, our trash collection vendor, will no longer collect our bulk trash. Do not place any bulk trash out for Potomac Disposal on Tuesdays or Fridays. Residents will be fined for placing bulk trash out on the wrong day. The new vendor information and detailed

instructions was mailed to you by ComSource.

There is a \$25 reward for picture or video proof of violations to the trash policy that identifies the violators. Picture or video proof is required to collect a reward, and some restrictions apply. All reports will remain anonymous. Trash policy violations include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Placing trash out in plastic bags instead of a trash receptacle with a lid.
- 2. Trash/recycling out on inappropriate days/non-pickup days.
- 3. Placing trash out on common area spaces instead of in front of home.

Trash includes loose trash, bagged trash, trash in cans and bulk trash.

North Village November meeting (continued)

by the North Village Board of Directors

We continue our coverage of the November 17 board meeting. Due to timing, our last article only discussed the agenda.

During residents time prior to the meeting, a resident from the Highland Hall community presented her concerns about cars speeding through the community on Highland Hall Drive. Several solutions were suggested, and our community manager took the action to do some research and make a recommendation to the board.

After residents time, the meeting was called to order, and the minutes of the last meeting were approved. The treasurer then reviewed the financial report for October. She reported that our operating cash is in good shape and that our investments are running \$200,000 over last year. Our income statement, however, shows just a small net loss through October, which is the result of the huge snow removal cost early in the year. The report did not include \$18,000 of tree work which had been completed recently and another \$2,000 to remove two large dead trees that was approved at the meeting. She also mentioned that our security contractor will exceed what we had budgeted for security. The board is concerned about the growing expense of our security contractor, especially if we are not getting the service that we expect.

In the maintenance committee report, the chairperson mentioned that several refrigerators and stoves were recent-

ly left out on the curb. These items cost assessment dollars to remove. Montgomery County Recycling will remove such items for free if residents call them and schedule a pickup. All of the information can be found on the county website.

Our landscaping contractor has made one pass with leaf removal throughout North Village and a second collection will be made in the next week or so. The exact dates of the leaf removal will be posted at the community entrances.

In another maintenance item, it was announced that Pepco has planted nine of the replacement trees that they had promised us when they removed some of our trees earlier this year. These nine trees are beautiful ornamental trees and will not damage curbs and sidewalks as the Oaks and Maples did.

The election committee reported that three incumbents whose terms are up in 2017 will run for the board again. We will be publishing statements from each of the candidates in a future article. Election material will be mailed to residents the week of December 13, and ballots are due back by 5 p.m. on Thursday, Jan. 19, 2017.

The chairperson of the safety committee reported that she is working with the police on ways to prevent delivery thefts. There have been incidents where packages left by Amazon have been stolen.

The most important item on the agenda was the approval of the 2017 budget for North Village Homes Corporation. The board approved the budget, and a letter has gone out to all residents giving the details of the new assessment. New payment booklets will be mailed to residents in December and the next quarterly payment is due on Sunday, Jan. 1, 2017.

The board reviewed bids from three audit firms and voted to accept the bid from Draper & McGinley, P.A. to provide our financial audit services starting in 2017 for the 2016 audit. We are changing our audit firm not because we are dissatisfied with the current auditor whom we have had for more than five years, but because it is good financial practice to periodically have a new set of experts looking over our books.

One final word about the confusion concerning the Thanksgiving holiday trash pickup. Please remember that our trash contractor, Potomac Disposal, will always pick up trash on the appointed day—holiday or no holiday. The only two holidays when they do not pick up are Christmas and New Year's Day if they should fall on the pickup day.

HOMES CORPORATION CALL FOR CANDIDATES

Volunteers needed for homes corporation boards of directors

Each year, the Village homes corporations seek candidates for election to their boards of directors. Interested residents are invited to submit applications for candidacy to the Nominating Committee of their local homes corporation.

Directors of homes corporations are responsible for setting assessments and managing the maintenance of all open spaces, streets, paths and lights that belong to the individual homes corporation.

Basic qualifications for board membership are time and interest, but whatever other knowledge, training, skills or experience one has will almost certainly be used in some capacity.

- 1. According to the documents, a candidate is not required to be a resident of Montgomery Village, except in Whetstone Homes Corporation and North Village Homes Corporation, where the candidate is required to be a resident homeowner. However, resident candidates must be in good standing with the Montgomery Village Foundation and their respective homes corporation with regard to covenants and policies and must be current in all assessment payments. In several cases, the Nominating Committee is given the authority to determine which of the nominees will be on the final slate of candidates.
- 2. To apply for candidacy, a prepared statement of the applicant's qualifications and interests must be delivered to any member of the Nominating Committee or to the Montgomery Village Foundation Office, 10120 Apple Ridge Road, no later than 5 p.m. on the closing dates stated in the box.
- 3. A candidate may be solicited or may volunteer. A resident nominating another resident must secure his/her written consent.

- 4. The number of candidates is unlimited.
- 5. All nominees will be requested to submit a single page (typewritten, double spaced) statement, which will be reproduced in the December, January or February issue of the *Village News* and will be sent to all voters along with the ballots (standard form will be supplied to board nominees).
- 6. Also, per a new Montgomery County Law, effective January 1, 2016, if elected, candidates must participate in a Montgomery County Commission on Common Ownership Communities (CCOC)-approved board member training class, to be scheduled and completed within 90 days of the start of their term of service.

Ballots will be mailed to the electorate either in December, January or February, depending on the specific corporation's election calendar.

In addition to electing directors, each homes corporation also elects a representative and an alternate representative to the MVF for one-year terms. Suggested names for the position will appear on the ballots.

Each board of directors consists of nine directors who serve three-year terms. The terms are staggered, creating three vacancies every year.

Note: While the word count for candidates' statements varies among homes corporations (check with your community manager), the word count for candidates' statements for the Montgomery Village News must not exceed 200 words per candidate. 

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MV Kids Learn About Stonehenge =

The structure that we call "Stonehenge" was built about 5,000 years ago and is just one part of a larger sacred landscape. Stonehenge is a massive monument in Wiltshire, England made up of standing stones, balanced stones and fallen stones and is set within a circular bank and ditch. It is the most complex of Neolithic and Bronze Age monuments in England.

How was Stonehenge used?


Before it was Stonehenge, the area was probably a burial site. It contains more than 350 burial mounds, and hundreds of human bones have been found, dating across 1,000 years, showing signs of cremation before burial.

The monument's entrance faces the rising sun on the day of the Summer Solstice. This orientation suggests that ancient astronomers may have used Stonehenge as a kind of solar calendar to track the movement of the sun and moon and mark the changing seasons.




Graffiti on the sarsen stones include ancient carvings of a dagger and an axe.

The larger stones of the outer ring, known as sarsens, are up to 30 feet tall and weigh about 25 tons each. It is believed that they were brought from Marlborough Downs, 20 miles to the north. The smaller stones, called "bluestones," weigh up to 4 tons and come from several different sites in western Wales.



Stonehenge and the Sun

Stonehenge seems to have been carefully aligned pointing to the Winter Solstice sunset. The heel stone, with its smooth flat face, was turned towards the midwinter sun. The Winter Solstice was immensely important because the people were economically dependent on monitoring the progress of the seasons.


