

Montgomery Village claims 30th Tree City USA title

Montgomery Village has been named a 2017 Tree City USA community by The National Arbor Day Foundation to honor its commitment to community forestry. It is the 30th consecutive year Montgomery Village has received this national recognition.

According to the National Arbor Day Foundation, Montgomery Village has met four criteria to become a Tree City USA, including a tree board or department; a tree care ordinance; maintaining a community forestry budget; and holding an official Arbor Day

Montgomery Village celebrated Arbor Day 2017 on Saturday, April 21 with an expanded program at the North Creek Nature Center with nature walks, tree plantings, programs and demonstrations, lake cleanup and free seeds and seedlings.

Montgomery Village is committed to effective urban forestry management. Maintaining this importance resource is vital to our public infrastructure. Cleaner air, improved storm water management, energy savings and increased property values are among the benefits enjoyed by Tree City USA communities.

The Tree City USA program is sponsored by The National Arbor Day Foundation in cooperation with the National Association of State Foresters and the USDA Forest Service.

Senator Nancy King, Delegate Kirill Reznik provide legislative update

Before the start of the April 26 Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Board of Directors meeting, Senator Nancy King and District 39 Delegate Kirill Reznik updated the Board and residents about the recent legislative session. Both thanked MVF for their input and testimony, when needed, for legislation that could affect Village residents and HOA or condominium

Senator King remarked that this year's session was very bipartisan. Legislators on both sides worked to pass a \$44.6 billion budget that fully funds all of the state's major priorities, including education, higher education, public safety and social services. Included in the state budget are a General Fund balance of \$100 million, a Rainy Day Fund of \$880 million and a \$4.622 billion Capital Improvements program.

King was nappy to report that over \$60 million was set for school construction in Montgomery County, as well as the establishment of a Healthy Schools Facility Fund for the entire state. This fund will help repair and replace items such as faulty HVAC systems in schools across the state. Additionally, \$62 million will be put into school safety; this includes funding for a School Resource Officer in every high school in the state, with the goal to have one in each middle school and elementary school in future

The senator also noted that the Child Care subsidy funding levels were increased, giving parents and guardians the ability to find and pay for child care. She was instrumental in establishing a flexible 5-day end-of-school year to give school boards flexibility in settling their calendars because of holidays, breaks and weather

Stemming from the 2013 bill that went into effect last year requiring smoke detectors to have sealed batteries, a new bill was passed that bans the sale of the old styles (replaceable battery models) in stores. King also thanked MVF for information and testimony on HOA bills that could have affected Village residents and other associations in the state. She noted that no new legislation in this area was passed.

Senator King said she is currently working on the Kirwan Commission, a group that looks at school systems

Since 1991, the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF), in partnership with Gaithersburg and Watkins Mill high schools, has awarded scholarships to deserving Village high school seniors totaling over \$50,000.

Scholarships are awarded to Watkins Mill and Gaithersburg high school students who have demonstrated outstanding scholastic achievement and participated in community or civic activities. Applicants are screened by a committee at each high school, with the Foundation's Scholarship Committee making the final selections in May. As established

by the MVF Board of Directors, all contributions are voluntary, and no assessment dollars are used to fund the program.

Committee members, chairs reaffirmed at MVF Board meeting

At the April 26 Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Board of Directors meeting, members of MVF's volunteer committees, as well as chairs for most of those committees, were reaffirmed to continue their service to the community.

As submitted, all current members of MVF committees were reaffirmed for continued service on their respective committees. The following committee chairs and vice chairs were appointed: Architectural Review Board (ARB) - Lisa Lewis, Chair and Gary Miller, Vice Chair; Audit Committee - Pat Seery, Chair and Keith Silliman, Vice Chair; Committee on the Environment - Claudette Lease, Chair; Recreation Committee - Karen Neilson, Chair; Investment Committee - Glenn Gargan, Chair.

For those interested in volunteering on a committee, full committee descriptions, meeting schedules and meeting packets are available online at www.montgomeryvillage.com. A committee member application is also available. For questions

regarding a particular committee's activities, please contact the MVF staff liaison associated with that committee.

OTHER AGENDA ITEMS

The Board approved changes to the MVF Swimming Pool Use Policy, putting the policy in line with Maryland Youth Camp Standards. This policy was last updated in 2010 and did not meet current regulations. In other pool-related items, a sole source contract for pool chemicals was awarded to Amato Industries for the 2018 pool season. Amato has been MVF's chemical provided for many years and continues to be awarded bids when bid out to multiple vendors; they provide great service at a competitive price.

A bid for replacement computers for MVF staff was approved as well. Office technology is replaced on a rolling basis, and each year items are reserved for during the budget process. Ten workstations and two laptops will be replaced this year, at a cost not to exceed \$16,495.30, from MVF's IT Contractor, The Dresner Group.

INFORMATION ITEMS

The Board reviewed a number of Information Items, which required no action at this time. Per standard practice before filing, the 990 and 990-T tax forms were presented. The 2019 Budget Schedule, including the date for the MVF Board Retreat (Saturday, June 2, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at North Creek Community Center, 20125 Arrowhead Road) were looked over. It was noted that Montgomery Village received its 30th consecutive Tree City Award, and a tree planting just prior to the meeting had taken place at Lake Whetstone. Finally, the Board reviewed some potential locations for an electronic marquee sign to be placed on MVF property. Board feedback suggested staff investigate a third location further south, closer to the entrance of the Village, along Montgomery Village Avenue.

EVP REPORT

Executive Vice President (EVP) Dave Humpton reported that he had been at the Montgomery County Planning Board hearing regarding the

Village Center Site Plan earlier that afternoon. The Planning Board approved the Preliminary Plan, Sketch Plan and Site Plan, noting the developer's willingness to work with the community to bring life back to this important commercial center. Humpton hoped there would be movement at the center by the end of the year.

He also thanked General Counsel Christopher Hitchens and Director of Community Management Karen Kodjanian for their work and research regarding all the potential legislation presented during this year's session. Fortunately, no bills that affect Village HOAs or condominium associations passed this year.

TREASURER'S REPORT

MVF Treasurer Bob Carey noted that 45% of its total assets are in Cash and Investments, continuing its strong financial position. Carey said that even though overall numbers are similar to last year at this time, Cash was ahead of last year by \$370,000.

Revenue for the month was reported as slightly unfavorable to the budget mostly due to the volatility of the market/ investment income and the continued decline of Village News advertising. Net Income for March was also \$44,076 behind the budget, though Revenue year-to-date was \$170,000 favorable to the budget, mainly from the Capital Contribution Fee. Carey said that the Delinquency Rate remains below 8% for the fifth consecutive quarter.

NEXT MEETING

The next MVF Board of Directors meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 24 in the North Creek Board Room, 20125 Arrowhead Road. The meeting begins promptly at 7:30 p.m. with Residents Time. Residents are invited and encouraged to attend. The meeting agenda and information packet will be available online at www.montgomeryvillage.com the week of the meeting.





in the United States and other countries and helps establish funding and education for the future (curriculums, engagement, etc.). The Commission is working to see that Maryland counties receive the correct amount of school funding.

Delegate Kirill Reznik, Chair of the Health and Social Services Subcommittee, gave updates on a number of health related initiatives, noting that healthcare is the single largest part of state budget-\$19 billion of the \$44 billion budget. He said the subcommittee worked to sure-up insurance coverage rates, reinstituting a plan similar to the Maryland Health Insurance Program; the changes will accept preexisting conditions at the same costs in the insurance pool through state subsidies.

Reznik also said that a lot of money was dedicated to opioid and mental health treatment this year, as well as rate increases for variety of Medicaid services. Rates were increased by about 6% for services including nursing home stays, medical adult daycare, home care programs, developmental and mental health programs and substance abuse.

It was reported that the Metro Funding Bill will contribute \$167 million annually (with additional contributed funds from Virginia and Washington, D.C.) to repair and improve the metro system without raising

Reznik also noted a few bills relating to treatment of animals. One states that research facilities using animals must make reasonable efforts to adopt the animals after research is completed, rather than euthanizing them. The second bans the sale of companion animals from retail stores, noting that many of these animals come from mills and unacceptable living conditions.

Lastly, he discussed firearm legislation that received much bipartisan praise. Reznik said that three bills were passed: one restricting ownership of weapons for convicted domestic abusers; the "Red Flag Law"

which can remove weapons from a home of someone identified as danger to themselves or others for 7 days; and finally, a ban of the sale and ownership of bump stocks and other accessories that convert semi-automatic weapons to fully automatic weapons.

Before the Senator and Delegate left, Reznik also made note of two items that would appear on Maryland ballots this year: the legislature set up a lockbox for taxes from casino revenue to go directly to education - approximately \$500 million each year-over and above the budgeted amount for education; and Election Day voter registration, which would allow citizens to register and vote on the same day in general elections.

Both District 39 representatives thanked MVF and the Board for the time to present these updates and the dedication to working together for the betterment of the com-

ARCHITECTURAL STANDARDS

Choosing a deck or fence stain

Spring is here, and it may be time to stain your deck or fence. Staining a deck or fence is a great way to protect the wood deck from moisture, ultra violet light damage and mold. The market offers several types of wood stains in an array of color choices.

In Montgomery Village, the Architectural Review Board (ARB) approves stained wood decks and fences and pre-finished composite wood decks. In some communities there are standard deck and fence colors in the community criteria, including some that require all decks or fences to remain unstained. In other communities, deck and fence colors are reviewed on an individual basis. Please be sure to consult your community criteria before purchasing a stain for your deck or fence to determine if you need to submit a Property Improvement Request (PIR) application. You may also call the Montgomery Village Foundation at 301-948-0110, and someone in the Architectural Standards Department can consult with you on what is required in your community, whether an application is needed, and recommend colors for you to consider.

The intent of the ARB is that decks and fences across the Village are a natural wood color. To this end, homeowners can seal and reseal their decks or fences with clear sealants without having to apply to the ARB for approval. This clear sealant allows the deck or fence to weather to grey. Please be aware that many sealants are

marketed as "natural" but are not completely clear. These products have color additives whose pigments are red, yellow or burgundy when the toner dries. Be sure to read the label to ensure that the product does not have these pigments. Red, yellow and burgundy stains and pigments are not approved on decks or fences in any community in Montgomery Village.

Colors that the ARB will approve generally are brown and grey tones, and there are a range of products and brands on the market that a home owner can apply to the ARB for. Decks made out of prefinished materials should follow the same color guideline. In some instances, rail systems with black metal pickets have also been approved.

Each proposed deck or fence stain is treated on an individual basis. The ARB will review the submission based on the requirements in the home's community criteria, the colors of the house and the colors of decks and fences on surrounding homes. Whatever your preference, be sure to clearly fill out the PIR Form and submit samples of your proposed color and materials to the ARB.



Trash in Middle Village

by the Middle Village Board of **Directors**

Placing bulk trash in the community is a violation that is subject to a fine; any resident caught dumping bulk trash on Middle Village property will be fined \$250. Homeowners will be fined if they or their tenants violate the trash policy. Trash policy violations include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Placing trash out in plastic bags instead of a trash receptacle with a lid.
- Placing trash/recycling out on inappropriate days/nonpickup days.
- Trashcans that are overflowing.
- 4. Placing trash out on common area spaces instead of in front of home.

Trash includes loose trash,

bagged trash and trash in cans. Are you making improvements or renovating your home? Please note that construction trash and debris is not permitted to be dumped in the community. Inform your contractor that they cannot dispose of the construction debris on Middle Village property. They must dispose of it off site. The resident will be fined if they or their contractor is dumping bulk trash, construction debris, furniture, etc. on Middle Village property.

REMEMBER

- Do not place household trash or recycling out until the evening before pickup or the morning of pickup. Any other time is a violation of the community trash policy and is subject to fines.
- Place the lid firmly on the trash can.
- If you have more trash than what your trash can is able to hold, purchase an additional trash can!

Note: If it does not fit into the blue recycling container, it is not recycling. If it does not fit into a 35-gallon trashcan, it is not normal household trash.

If it is yard waste, it must be in a paper bag or bundled and placed out with recycling.

KIDS AT PLAY

Spring is here, and that means children will be out running and playing. Drive slowly through our community and keep an eye out for children crossing streets, playing in the parking lots and running from between or behind cars. Safety is everyone's responsibility.

STORM DRAINS

There are numerous storm drains located along the curbs throughout the community. Please do not dispose of any items in the storm drains other than water! Placing an item such as a water bottle in the drain may seem harmless, but it can be the start of a very costly problem, which can translate into increased assessment fees. Remember, no bottles; paint cans; or hazardous materials such as paint, oils, gasoline, etc. are ever to be placed in the storm drains. Help keep our community water system flowing efficiently and protect your property from flood damage.

ASSESSMENTS

We live in a community that requires every homeowner to pay assessment fees. Assessments are used to pay contractors for landscaping, snow removal, trash collection, collection of illegally dumped trash, lighting, repairs on community property, etc. If you are a homeowner, you were provided with this information during closing.

Reminder: Assessments are due paid monthly. Your payment must be received by ComSource on or before the 15th of the month to avoid late charges. Your regular payments allow us to continue providing services to our community.

Homeowners who are delinquent with their assessment payments must pay

their past due balance in full or make arrangements to pay them. The first step to making payment arrangements is to contact Delphine Matthews at 301-924-7355 or *dmatthews*@ comsource.com.

North Village board meeting (continued)

by the North Village Board of Directors

As promised in the last issue of the Village News, we continue our coverage of the April board of directors meeting that was held on Thursday, April 19. The April 20 issue of the Village News went to press before the meeting and could only address the items on the agenda.

The board first reviewed the minutes of the February board meeting, followed by the treasurer's delivering the financial reports for February and March. The treasurer announced that we finally received the insurance money from GEICO for the damaged entrance sign to Picton and enough to cover the full cost. After paying for our last snow storm of the season on March 20 and March 21, the 2018 snow removal budget will be close to fully spent. The wind in those storms has forced us to incur more tree removal costs than expected, but we are still under budget for the year, and funds are still available for our scheduled tree removal.

Next, the committees gave their reports. The audit committee announced that the audit report had been sent to board members by e-mail and the board would vote on the report under old business. The budget committee reported that the 2019 budget meeting will be set at the June board meeting. The maintenance committee pointed out that our contractor, Potomac Disposal, had not been emptying the five community trash cans. We pay extra for that additional service. The publicity committee announced that the Montgomery County Planning Board will be conducting a public hearing on the Montgomery Village Center on April 26.

The management report from our community manager announced that the next maintenance inspection was scheduled for May 2 and that the mowing season will begin in approximately two weeks. Our landscaping contractor is presently performing dormant pruning of bushes in the townhome communities. Other items in the management report agenda were to be further discussed under the old and new business.

Under old business, the board voted to accept the audit report. The second item of old business was an update on the path lighting project, which replaces 53 path lighting fixtures with a new LED design. Each contractor bidding on the project was provided with maps of the location of the fixtures in Picton, Perry Place and McRory, as well as information about the fixtures. A requestfor-proposal (RFP) will be sent to each contractor to begin the bidding process.

Next, the board discussed new business, starting with the reaffirmation of the board policies. Eleven policies were presented to the board for their review and affirmation. All of the policies were reaffirmed except for the parking policy. Because of the numerous complaints from residents in some of the townhome communities about the lack of parking, the board asked the attorney for legal advice concerning suspension of reserve parking spaces of those residents who are in arrears of their assessment payments. The lawyer recommended some specific wording for such a parking policy, which led to considerable discussion by the board.

The board modified the proposed wording slightly.

In the final item of new business, the board was asked to approve the Private Property Maintenance (PPM) Inspection Agreement for 2018. Under this agreement the board contracts with the Montgomery Village Foundation to perform private property maintenance inspections of the 888 homes in North Village. Violation letters will be sent to homeowners where violations are detected.

At the conclusion of the new business items, the board adjourned their meeting.

- noted the need to obtain original approved dock design to aid in the permitting process for county approvals.







May is National Water Safety Month

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), drowning is the leading cause of death in children ages 1 to 4. In Montgomery Village there are parks and other green spaces adjacent to bodies of water including streams, ponds and lakes. When visiting an area near one of those streams, ponds or lakes, it is important to stay vigilant, especially if you are visiting with children. When


