

MVF Board discusses proposed county legislation on short-term rentals at May meeting

Over a year ago, Montgomery County Councilmember Hans Reimer proposed new county zoning provisions to permit and regulate short-term (less than 30 day) residential property rentals through services such as Airbnb, Flipkey, Homeaway, etc. For many years, short-term rentals of property have been prohibited, but the county council recognizes that property owners and visitors to the county have nonetheless been offering and renting short term residential

In response to Reimer's proposal, many residents and community associations initially voiced general concerns about the effect of short-term rentals on quality of life in neighborhoods. At the same time, many short-term rental hosts praised the personal income benefits of short term rentals and the contribution of short-term rentals in satisfying the needs for several categories of visitors to our region, from scientists and medical personnel, to government and industry interns and tourist families.

The county council asked the Planning Board to hold public hearings and develop a Zoning Text Amendment (ZTA) that established reasonable parameters of short-term residential rentals based on positions raised by proponents and opponents.

A draft ZTA was released in early May 2017 and revised and transmitted to the county council for further review on May 17.

In short, the proposed ZTA would permit rentals of residential properties for less than





Too good to be true: know your consumer rights about solar energy

Most solar energy installers are skilled and effective professionals. But if problems arise, Montgomery County residents have a strong ally on their side.

When it comes to preventing problems between businesses and the people they serve, Montgomery County is proud to have a strong track record. The county's Office of Consumer Protection, or OCP, is a law-enforcement body that offers advice on a range of consumer-related issues, from home ownership to health club membership.

Specifically, the office and its experts and investigators strive to enforce consumer protection laws that target unfair and deceptive business practices. OCP activities include complaint resolution, law enforcement, education, legislation, advocacy, licensing and outreach.

A new industry recently gained prominence on OCP's sprawling radar screen: solar energy.

"The market for solar has taken off relatively recently, but it's a very complicated purchase," said OCP Director Eric Friedman. "We're trying to educate consumers. They may be subject to deception and misrepresentation."

HELPING SOLAR RUN SMOOTHLY

Although the nature of problems and complaints varies widely, in a nutshell, installing solar can be an intricate exercise, even in cases where it's purportedly simple. Falling technology prices have helped lead to virtual land rushes of investment in solar. Accessible solar energy is a good thing for the planet, and for consumers who can get a better deal on monthly energy bills.

At the same time, fluctuating energy prices and complex contracts can sometimes create the conditions for misunderstanding or even misconduct. In a very few extreme cases, major crimes like fraud have been alleged.

FINDING THE RIGHT **SOLAR PROVIDER**

Fortunately, OCP offers a range of guidance and assistance for county consumers thinking about going solar or feeling pain after the fact.

According to Friedman, there are an estimated 194 solar panel companies operating in the state of Maryland alone. The large majority of these companies are reputable outlets that do what they say they are going to do.

A few bad apples have attempted to spoil the barrel for some residents, however. But



that's where OCP can step in.

To pick the right company for you and make sure your installation goes smoothly, consider the following points from the recent OCP document "Solar Energy: A Consumer's

- Pre-plan. Make sure your roof is a good candidate for solar. Review electric bills and use reputable online calculators (such as that provided by the United States Department of Energy) to get an idea of potential cost and energy
- Pull Permits. Solar installation is a home improvement project, so permits must be obtained before work begins.
- Check Licensing. Make sure your installers are properly licensed by the Maryland Home Improvement Commission (MHIC).
- Get Recommendations. Ask friends and neighbors about the systems they installed and the results they obtained.
- Get Quotes. Three quotes are recommended. However, be aware that each installer may select a different system and setup, meaning apples-to-apples comparisons are not always possible.
- Do Your Homework. Research bidders and the bids themselves. Sometimes companies will make unrealistic or overly optimistic estimates of time and payback periods. Ask about the process for making repairs and who is obligated to pay electricity bills if/ when the system is out of
- Purchase vs. Lease vs. Power Purchase Agreements (PPA). When compared with purchasing, a lease or PPA provides lower upfront costs. However, some leases and PPAs require long-term contracts and sizeable down payments in exchange for lower monthly payments. Check contracts for large,

annual increases and ask how long the lease lasts.

Minimum Power. See if your contract requires that the system generates a minimum power each month and, if it doesn't create that amount, how credits will be apportioned to your monthly electricity

SUCCESS STORIES

OCP has a number of measures at its disposal to combat bad actors. Some of them are relatively benign, others are more intense.

However, Friedman indicated that OCP has successfully pursued bad-apple solar installers on behalf of county residents.

"We've been able to unravel a lot of these," Friedman said. "[Results include] getting work done or getting a refund. One time, we assisted in bringing criminal prosecution against an installer who stole money."

The reasons for complaints vary, Friedman added.

'We've had cases where the homeowner didn't know whether they purchased or leased a system," Friedman said. "We've had projects sold by non-licensed home improvement contractor or not done by a licensed electrician. Some were negligent in doing the work.'

Ultimately, as is often the case with big decisions, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

"Many consumer purchases require some homework," Friedman said. "Think of it like buying a car. Find out the nature of the transaction. Why are you really buying a solar system, and what do you really want to get out of it?"


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

30 days throughout most zones in the county, upon obtaining a short-term rental license (rentals lasting longer than 30 days continue to require a standard rental license). Owners of properties used for short-term rentals are limited to 90 days of short term rental if they are not present during the rental; if the owner is present during the rental, then the 90-day limit does not apply. A property owner must also comply with all applicable provisions of community association documents, such as restrictions on rentals and parking regula-

Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) General Counsel Christopher Hitchens noted that county-wide, community opposition to the proposed ZTA has waned, especially down-county, where proximity to regional employers and institutions, coupled with availability of public transportation, create a very favorable climate for short-term rental properties. He noted that in most Montgomery Village communities, there are currently no restrictions on rentals generally, and that governing documents would have to be amended if a community wanted to regulate short-term rentals.

Executive Vice President (EVP) Dave Humpton asked for input from the Board, specifically for direction and suggestions. Board members cited some opinion that overall, maintenance of short-term rental properties was superior to long-term rentals, but were also very concerned about parking issues, as there is already very limited space in many townhouse and condominium neighborhoods in the Village. Another concern voiced by the Board was whether short-term hosts would provide guests with access codes to condominium buildings and how this practice might affect security and security costs for associations.

MVF staff will closely monitor the proposed ZTA and continue to keep the Board informed on changes and county council hearing dates.

AGENDA ITEMS

In committee-related items, the Board reappointed Melanie O'Brien as chair of the Communications Committee, as well as appointed Bryan Price and Rahul Khanna to the Communications and Recreation committees, respectively.

The Board also approved a sole-source bid from Dell for technology purchases, in accordance with the Reserve budget. A dozen desktop computers, a laptop and additional monitors and stands were slated for replacement at a cost not to exceed \$23,500.

Finally, the Whetstone Community Center playground replacement project, originally slated for a 2018 Reserve project, was moved to a 2017 Reserve project, with a budget of \$79,261. The playground was slated for replacement in 2015, but delayed because other playgrounds needed replacement sooner than anticipated. Upon inspection this spring, staff found components that are showing signs of wear and age, and recommended the replacement be done this year. A work group to provide input on the replacement will be formed in the near future.

EVP REPORT

EVP Humpton noted that MVF-owned pools would be opening for Memorial Day

Weekend, including the Apple Ridge Pool, which was both on schedule and on budget. He said there would be a ribbon cutting event scheduled for Wednesday, June 21 at 6:30 p.m. to officially open the pool for the season.

Humpton also said that earlier that day the county council adopted its FY 2018 budget, which includes additional police resources for the 6th District and funds for resurfacing county roads. Included in roadway projects were Montgomery Village Avenue and Watkins Mill Road.

TREASURER'S REPORT

MVF Treasurer Bob Carey reported on the financial health of the organization for both the month of April and the year-to-date (YTD). Carey said that MVF remains in a solid financial position with \$8.2 million in Cash and Investments. He noted a \$900,000 increase in fixed assets for 2017, mostly due to the Apple Ridge Pool renovation.

Revenue for the month was reported at \$726,000, slightly unfavorable to the budget due to lower than expected disclo-

sure fees and camps and classes; these were partially offset by an increase in advertising revenue. Operating Expenses for the month were favorable to the budget by \$95,000.

Carey said YTD Revenue was favorable to the budget at \$2.9 million, due mainly to investment income; YTD Expenses were also favorable at \$2.1 million due to lower than expected salaries and maintenance costs. Capital Contribution Fees received through April totaled \$45,789 and Contributions to Reserves in the amount of \$90,830 were made in accordance with the budget.



Montgomery Village drowning ruled accidental

Detectives from the Montgomery County Police Department Major Crimes Division have been investigating the June 2 death of a 22-month-old boy that occurred Lake Whetstone in Montgomery Village. The boy is identified as Malik Bojang of the 18700 block of Pier Point Place. Investigators released the results of an autopsy that was conducted in Baltimore by the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner (OCME). The OCME ruled Bojang's cause of death as an accidental drowning.

On Friday, June 2 at approximately 7:31 p.m., the **Emergency Communication** Center (ECC) received a 9-1-1 call from Bojang's adult family member who was reporting him missing from the Lake Whetstone Park located at 18701 Montgomery Village Avenue. As 6th District officers and Fire and Rescue personnel were responding to the park, ECC received a second call from a resident who had

located Bojang face down and unresponsive in the water. Bojang was transported to a local hospital where he was pronounced deceased.

The investigation by detectives has determined that Bojang was with an adult family member at a tot lot playground at the park. Other families and children were also at the playground. At approximately 7:31 p.m., the family member noticed that Bojang was no longer present in the playground area and called to report him as missing.

The Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Board of Directors, on behalf of the entire community, extends its deepest sympathy to the family on the loss of Malik.

The Montgomery County Police Department and MVF remind residents to be extra cautious and aware of surroundings when visiting the Village's lakes and parks. The police also offer the following water safety tips:

- Never leave children unattended around any body of water (bathtubs, pools, ornamental backyard ponds, etc.).
- Learn to swim. But remember, even good swimmers can drown.
- Learn CPR.
- Pay attention to local weather conditions and forecasts.
- Watch out for the "dangerous too's" (...too tired, too cold, too far from safety, too much sun, too much strenuous activity).
- Always have a phone.
- Know where your children are at all times.
- Don't rely on substitutes. The use of flotation devices and inflatable toys cannot replace parental supervision. Such devices could suddenly shift position, lose air or slip out from underneath, leaving the child in a dangerous situation.

Whetstone Community Center playground replacement

The Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Department of Recreation, Parks and Culture is developing plans for the replacement of the Whetstone Community Center (WCC) playground located at 19140 Brooke Grove Court.

The playground at WCC is used by community members and a variety of MVF programs including Creative Discovery, Whetstone After-School Club and summer camp programs. Playgrounds offer children places to exercise and play outdoors aiding in their physical development. Staff is looking for residents who use the playground or are interested in offering input on the new equipment which

will replace this 24-yearold playground.

The first meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Thursday, June 22 at WCC. At this meeting, staff is looking to hear from residents about what they would like to see in a new playground at this site. Information collected at this meeting will be used to develop specifications for the project.

Activity Card Update 2017

Even if there are no changes, we need a current Information Letter every year in order to process Activity Cards. If you haven't received the Information Letter/ Rights Form, please notify the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) as soon as possible.

Residents of Eastgate, Middle Village (Clubside) and North Village will be receiving new photo activity cards this year. Residents from communities that received photo activity cards in previous years - East Village, Maryland Place, Northgate, Patton Ridge, Poplar Spring, South Village (Dockside, Millrace, Nathan's Hill, Grover's Forge, Hamptons), Stedwick and Whetstone - who do not yet have their photo activity card, will need to come to the MVF Office to get one this year.



Detectives request community assistance in Montgomery Village homicide



Tips to consider when adding ground cover to your landscape

Before you cover your entire backyard with hardscape materials, consider planting ground cover plants, which are useful for filling awkward spaces that might remain bare soil or be covered over with paver stones. Select ground cover for its beautiful foliage, flowers or scent to make the most of your yard. Remember to choose plants that will thrive in your conditions. Ground cover will usually grow thick and prevent weeds from emerging. Evergreen-type ground covers are particularly desirable, as they remain green during all four seasons.

There are ground covers that will do well in various conditions from sunny, part shade or shady areas. Plants that do well in sunny, hot and dry areas are Junipers, Sedums and Hens and Chicks. Purple Ice plant and Stonecrop succulents do well for larger spaces. These plants require very little water and are easy to grow.

Some ground cover thrive in sun to part shade conditions. Varieties that flourish in small areas are Candytuft, Creeping Phlox, Woolly Thyme, Lamb's Ear and Barren Strawberry plants. The common Juniper, Blue Star Juniper, Germander, Mondo grass and Vinca vine are beneficial to larger areas of ground where they will spread out and fill the space.


Shade loving plants will grow well in areas under trees


and shrubs and close to structures. Ground covers that work well in small shady areas are Irish moss, Running Phlox and Mountain Lover. Pachysandra, English ivy and Periwinkle all flourish in large shady areas.

Before planting, prepare the soil as you would for any other type of planting. Ground covers can be used as transitions from lawn to taller plants in the garden bed. These plants can also be used for erosion control on hills such as the ground cover Carpet Bugle. Ground cover adds interest to your landscape and are easily maintained.

Kids at play

Summer is almost here and that means children will be out running and playing. Drive slowly through our community and keep an eye out for children crossing streets, playing in the parking lots and running from between or behind cars. Safety is everyone's responsibility.

SHOPPING CARTS

Shopping carts are being removed from the neighboring stores in the shopping center and being left in the Middle Village community. Do not remove any shopping carts from the shopping center—it is illegal. If you have shopping carts in your possession, return them to the shopping center.

ASSESSMENTS

We live in a community that requires every homeowner to pay assessment fees. Assessments are used to pay contractors for landscaping, snow removal, trash collection, collection of illegally dumped trash, lighting, repairs on community property, etc. If you are a homeowner, you were provided with this information during closing.

Reminder: Assessments are due monthly. Your payment must be received by Comsource on or before the 15th of the month to avoid late charges. Your regular payments allow us to continue providing services to our community.

Homeowners who are delinquent with their assessment payments must pay their past due balance in full or make arrangements to pay them. The first step to making payment arrangements is contacting Delphine Matthews at Comsource at 301-924-7355 or e-mail *dmatthews@comsource.com*.

PET OWNERS

We received several complaints about dogs roaming the neighborhoods off leash, illegally entering yards and making yards unsafe/unsanitary. Others are complaining because neighbors aren't cleaning up after their pet(s). We wanted to share the law prior to your being reported and required to pay a fine.

Dog at large: "Any dog is at large if it is outside the owner's premises and not leashed, unless it is a service dog, is in a dog exercise area designated by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission, or is participating in an approved activity. The common area of a homeowner's association, condominium or cooperative is not the owner's premises. Penalty for Violation: \$100 for first offense, \$500 for each subsequent violation."

Unwanted Contact: "The pet owner must prevent unwelcome or unsolicited threatening physical contact or close proximity to a person or a domestic animal that occurs outside the owner's property that may cause alarm in a reasonable person, such as biting, chasing, tracking, inhibiting movement or jumping. Penalty for Violation: \$500."

Animal Defecation ("pooper scooper" law) (Montgomery County Code, Sec. 5-203(a) (2)): "An owner must not

allow an animal to damage or defecate on property outside of the owner's property. An animal may defecate on public property or the common area of property in which the owner shares an interest if the owner immediately removes and disposes of the feces by a sanitary method approved by the Director. Feces may be picked up in a plastic bag. If this bag is placed inside another plastic bag, it may be put out for disposal in your normal household trash. Penalty for Violation: \$100."

Animal Trespass (Montgomery County Code, Sec. 5-203(a)(3)): "An owner must not allow an animal to enter private property without the property owner's permission. Penalty for Violation: \$100."

WHETSTONE WATCH

May budget meeting

On May 23, the Whetstone Budget Committee met in open session to discuss concerns with the association's short and long-term financial stability. The treasurer presented a committee report detailing the challenges facing the community over the next 25 years.

The short-term financial picture showed a projected shortfall over the next five years in maintenance funds of \$150,000 to \$350,000. This shortfall is mainly due to the fact that the general assessment amount has not been raised in five years, and inflation has eroded the community's purchasing power. To cover this shortfall, an assessment increase of \$70 to \$160 will be needed. An alternative would be to decrease maintenance activities within the community over the next five years. Whetstone would need to reduce maintenance work by approximately 40% to close the gap between current funding and what is estimated as the community's basic main-

tenance needs. Additionally, in the short term, there is a projected five year shortfall of \$53,000 in funding for the reserve accounts. This is mainly due to anemic returns on the Certificate of Deposit portion of the reserve accounts. Currently, Whetstone is receiving approximately 1.8% return; a return of 3% annually is needed to properly fund the reserves. The committee explored several options to address this shortfall and will likely be recommending some changes in the investment strategy that should cover this shortfall.

The long-term picture also showed some distress with

a projected shortfall over 20 years of \$1,015,328 or \$51,000 per year. Again, this is mainly due to the anemic returns in the CD portion of the reserve account. The solution for this problem will likely be covered by the solution for the short term issue in this area.

The committee will be making recommendations to the board at the June meeting including a recommendation for a general assessment increase.

Bloom and blight

Summer has all but just arrived. Stedwick is an attractive community, with a variety of trees and shrubs and annuals flowering at entries. Houses are selling. The Stedwick Board of Directors and the maintenance committee work to keep our community attractive and environmentally healthy. We have installed three conservation landscapes/rain gardens and are exploring adding a few more. Montgomery County's Department of Environmental Protection has helped with that process from the initial identification of possible locations, identification of native plants to include, review of proposed designs, partial reimbursement of the costs and a reduction in the Water Quality Protection Fee paid by the Stedwick Homes Corporation.

A meeting was recently held with the principal and some of the teachers of Stedwick Elementary School to see if conservation landscapes may be added around the school to provide an opportunity for the students to learn about the environmental impact of rain runoff, improve the environmental health of the school facility and reduce the school property's rainwater discharge onto Stedwick Homes Corporation community space.

Most of the trees provided by Montgomery County's Tree Montgomery last fall are doing well. Pepco will provide additional trees this fall. We are working to increase our community tree canopy and to help moderate the extremes in our weather.

There are several local organizations focused on the environment that may be of interest to members of our larger Montgomery Village community. The Coalition for Transit Alternatives to Mid-County Highway Extended (TAME) can be contacted at TAMECoalition@ gmail.com. The Maryland Chapter of the American Chestnut Foundation is working to reestablish the American Chestnut in Maryland forests. Its website is www.mdtacf.org. Friends of Ten Mile Creek and Little Seneca Reservoir are working to protect that portion of the public drinking water supply that we all depend upon. Its website is www.tenmilecreek.org. The Muddy Branch Alliance is a watershed stewardship organization for the Muddy Branch watershed. Its website is www. muddybranch.org.

The increased number of vehicles that appear to be stored in our community are contributing to parking problems in several of our communities.

The increased parking of trucks and construction-related vehicles along Watkins Mill Road beyond Apple Ridge Road is contributing to the "industrialization" of that road on the northwest side of Montgomery Village. The Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) and Comcast are the

most obvious contributors. The recent installation of a portajohn in that area, apparently by WSSC, contributes to a growing blight on our larger community.

Monument Realty's maintenance of the former golf course has gone from "bloom to blight" with the county's apparent approval. The county's property maintenance inspector indicates that Monument Realty is complying with all county regulations regarding maintenance of that property.

The next SHC-wide inspection will take place on Tuesday, June 13, so if you know about items or issues that need to be checked, please contact our agent at the phone number or e-mail address below.

PATTON RIDGE REPORT

Importance of storm water management

While we have familiarity about our roads above ground, equally important is knowing the whereabouts and condition of storm drains below ground. This will play an important role as we move forward to prepare for what may follow when Monument Realty begins developing its site.

As such, the board contracted the engineering firm, Vika Maryland, LLC in Germantown to survey our storm water system. The board determined it was necessary to go through this process primarily based on our aging community and lack of storm drain details.

Failed pipes are far more costly to repair in an emergency versus knowing what is ahead of us and planning as best we can for the future. Additionally, most of our storm water drains onto the property now owned by Monument Realty.

On May 22, Vika began performing Closed Circuit TV (CCTV) inspections using a robotic underground camera in Fairway Islands and will continue until all of the communities have been reviewed. Once the CCTV inspections are complete, Vika will evaluate its findings and provide a summary to the board. These inspections will not cause disruptions to our residents.

The next phase of this project will be to have, as neces-

sary, the repairs/replacements evaluated and added to the reserve study for Patton Ridge Homes Corporation to further assist with future planning and funding of the reserves.

The board planned to have a reserve study done early in 2017 and will now delay the study to either late 2017 or early 2018 to await and include the outcome of this project.

LETTER TO THE COUNTY PLANNING DEPARTMENT

In April, a letter was sent, and published in the *Village News*, to Mr. Troy Leftwich, Montgomery Planning Department, concerning the development density plans on the former golf course by Monument Realty. To date, there has been no response from either the Planning Department or Monument Realty.

What's in a name?

In a nation of many immigrants, or the descendants thereof, the names we use or have adopted are most profound—especially in the wake of a political climate that is very "anti-immigration," not just here in the U.S., but also throughout Western Europe. Not only is this biased mentality ironic, it is a paradox to the very Precepts of Liberty, and what the Statue of Liberty symbolizes.

As we prepare to celebrate the Fourth of July, which portends to be a "Celebration of Liberty/Independence," we must not only ponder, "what's in a name (or word)?," but we must strongly consider their origins, and if our thinking and actions hold to their true meanings and ideals. Though this speaks to the changing values on a national level, it is most relevant at the local level—namely in Montgomery County, and most importantly, in Montgomery Village.

I was brought here at the age of nine by my Liberian mother, who had divorced my French father several years before, and as such, was an immigrant, like many here in this very diverse county and community. After many years, I became a naturalized citizen in 1999, and voted for the very first time in 2000, proudly exercising my Right of Suffrage – after serving our nation with eight years in the Naval Reserves (simply as a "green card holder"). I've stated all of this to give you a bit of background knowledge of this author, and as a preface to the main topic of this article.

Per the African concept of "Sankofa" (one must know from whence they come, in order to know where you're going), all residents here should learn of the history of Montgomery Village, as it was the "brainchild" of the visionary Clarence Kettler (circa 1962). The purpose here is not to teach the Village's rich, dynamic history and growth, but

to get you to consider "what's in a name," and most importantly, that of Montgomery Village.

One could clearly deduce that the first part of its name comes from Montgomery County, which was named after Richard Montgomery (December 2, 1738 – December 31, 1775), who was a major general in the Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War. My main focus is the second part of our community's name, that being "Village."

Most dictionaries define village as: "a small community or group of houses in a rural area, larger than a hamlet and usually smaller than a town, and sometimes (as in parts of the U.S.) incorporated as a municipality." Though this denotative definition no longer seems apropos for our community, I offer my personal or connotative definition, as influenced by the African epigram, "it takes a village to raise a child." From this concept, I perceive a "Village" to mean "family/ extended family." I strongly believe in such a concept, and bemoan the reality that such concepts are being/have been lost here and elsewhere.

Nonetheless, I hope that you will ponder the question, "what's in a name?," along with considering what we call ourselves—in particular, Montgomery Village. If we are to thrive as a community, we must embrace the notions/concepts of being a "village," and being more kind and considerate of/to our neighbors and our environment, by taking ownership of our actions.

This is demonstrated by:

- Not trashing/dumping in our communities
- Not speeding in our communities (especially where children are playing, which holds true for most roads throughout Montgomery Village)
- Picking up after your pets in our neighborhoods (key word:

neighbor)

 Not disturbing the peace/playing music too loudly in our neighborhoods (especially after 9 p.m.)

One could present a laundry list of "Nots to Do," but let us strive to doing this:

 Being considerate of others in our community/village

If we are truly "the change that we've been waiting for," then we must consider "what's in a name" and answer these following questions with sincerity, integrity and honesty:

- "Does the name of our community mean anything to me (in my 'collective self-concept')?"
- "Do I represent this name well (as one hopefully does one's family)?"
- "Am I truly a member of this community/ family/village (via my solidarity and actions)?"

As we should be proud of our diversity and our varied cultural/ethnic backgrounds, we can only thrive under a unifying concept, or name, and with a mindset towards the common good, for all persons, within the Village.

Though the saying, "actions speak louder than words (names)" is true, please know that it is our identification with names/words that determines our actions, and defines who we are as human beings and as humane members of a group, county, state, nation and, yes, even a "village."

So, in the name of "The Pursuit of Happiness, Freedom and Liberty," I wish you all a most happy and safe Fourth of July.

As we work outdoors, we must be aware of safety - remember that falls from ladders are one of the leading causes of serious injury around the house. And don't forget to be aware around the outdoor grill. Numerous fires and burns are caused by careless grilling

Summer is also the time to remind all residents to be alert, vigilant and not afraid to call 911, the Montgomery County Police (301-279-8000) or our security service, American Protective Services (240-631-8383), when they see suspicious or criminal activity.

TRASH AND RECYCLING PICKUP

We noticed many recycling "blue boxes" out on the curb a day early during the week after the Memorial Day holiday. Remember, if a county holiday falls during the week, all recycling collections scheduled on or after the holiday will be made one day later. If there is any doubt about the county recycling pickup, you can check the schedule on the county website, and please remember all items to be collected must be out at the curb by 7 a.m. on collection day.

However, our trash company does not change its schedule for most holidays. They collect on every holiday except New Year's Day and Christmas Day. If your regular trash is supposed to be picked up on a holiday, then you should put out your trash the night before, regardless of the holiday (except for New Year's and Christmas).

We cannot stress enough how important it is for residents to follow the simple guidelines for their trash collection. People are leaving their bulk pickup items out on the curb on the weekend, and it remains there until Thursday's pickup by our trash contractor, Potomac Disposal.

Please remember to schedule your bulk pickup by calling

Potomac Disposal at 301-294-9700 and then place it out on the curb on Wednesday night—no earlier. Remember that bulk pickup is only done on Thursdays. For your normal trash, please place it inside a trash can with a lid. Trash cans must be animal-resistant—don't give rats a chance in our community.

MAINTENANCE ISSUES

Our maintenance contractor has been busy planting annuals at the community entrance signs. He has been tasked to keep them watered so that they will look nice all summer long.

Our recent inspections have identified a lot of tree work that needed to be done. Our contractor, Elliott Tree Service, has just about completed a huge tree removal job-over 25 trees. That will nearly exhaust our tree budget for the year. We want to remind homeowners that they are responsible for the removal of dead trees on their personal property. Also, homeowners of single-family homes are responsible for the repair of all fences on the perimeter of their property.

BOARD ACTIONS

The draft audit report for the year 2016 has been reviewed by the audit committee and distributed to the board for their review. The independent auditors are required to report any material misstatements in the financial statements as well as any significant deficiencies and/or material weaknesses in the internal financial controls of our homes corporation.

The next board meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Thursday, June 15, in the North Creek Board Room, 20125 Arrowhead Road. We want to remind residents that if they want to address the board at one of the board meetings, they must be present at 7 p.m. and sign in. That is when residents time is held. If you arrive too late after residents time is over and the board meeting has started, you will not be heard.







Sunglasses are protective eyewear designed to prevent bright sunlight and ultraviolet light from damaging or discomforting the eyes.

Sunglasses History

In the early 20th century, they were also known as sun cheaters (cheaters being an American slang term for glasses).

In prehistoric and historic time, Inuit peoples wore flattened walrus ivory "glasses", looking through narrow slits to block harmful reflected rays of the sun.

In the early 1920s, the use of sunglasses started to become more widespread, especially among movie stars.

Inexpensive mass-produced sunglasses made from celluloid were first produced by Sam Foster in 1929. Foster began selling sunglasses under the name Foster Grant from a Woolworth on the Boardwalk of Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Polarized sunglasses first became available in 1936, when Edwin H. Land began experimenting with making lenses with his patented Polaroid filter.

By 1938, Life magazine wrote of how sunglasses were a "new fad for wear on city streets ... a favorite affectation of thousands of women all over the U.S."

Since the 1940s, sunglasses have been popular as a fashion accessory, especially on the beach.

At present, Xiamen, China, is the world's largest producer of sunglasses, exporting 120 million pairs each year.
