### Apple Ridge Pool and Bathhouse renovations to begin soon

With the pool season winding down and Apple Ridge Pool closed for the season, the pool and bathhouse renovations at Apple Ridge will soon be under way. Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) staff has been draining the pool and moving out equipment, supplies and pool furniture to other locations in preparation for the renovation.

It is anticipated that the contractor will begin getting the site ready for demolition next week. The site preparation will include installing construction fencing around the perimeter of the pool and parking lot. During the renovation, the parking lot will not be acces-

sible to the public, as it will be used for storing materials and as a construction entrance for dump trucks and other construction vehicles.

The tennis courts will still be open, but will only be accessible through the tennis court gate on the side of the courts closest to the Georgetown Hill Early School (GHES). All other gates will be locked. The basketball court will also only be accessible through the MVF greenspace between the tennis courts and the GHES property. The soccer field will be accessible through the MVF

### **SWIM TEAMS 2016**

I always hear from other local swim team leaders how our pools shine when their teams come to visit Montgomery Village. Special thanks to our aquatics staff for their hard work in making our pools stand out so that our swim teams can continue to be successful.

### VILLAGE CENTER UPDATE

Atlantic Realty Companies (ARC) has formally filed a sketch plan application with M-NCPPC for redevelopment of the Village Center. This is the beginning of a lengthy process during which the county planning department will coordinate an intensive review of the application by many county agencies and will entertain comments from interested parties.

The new application seeks to create a mixed use development of approximately 300 dwelling units and approximately 150,000 square feet of commercial development on approximately 19 acres of land. The redevelopment will include construction of replacement pad sites, revisions to the shopping center layout and construction of the new residential units to the rear of the site, closest to Watkins Mill Road.

An even more detailed site plan must be approved by the Planning Board, which will follow approval of the sketch plan. There is some information on the MVF website about this project, and further information or questions can be addressed to M-NCPPC Planner Crystal Myers at crystal.myers@ montgomeryplanning.org. The MVF Board of Directors and the Commercial Architectural Review Committee will continue to review plans as the process continues.

greenspace along the west and north sides of the pool (there is a pedestrian tunnel under Apple Ridge Road that leads from the MVF Office parking lots to the described MVF greenspace).

The pool and bathhouse renovation will take approximately 9 months, and the pool is scheduled to re-open for the 2017 pool season. The new "leisure" pool will fea-ture a "lazy river" or current channel; an open body slide; a double family slide; water features including dump buckets and pipe falls; spray ground; beach entry; in-water sun-shelf lounging area; an underwater bench sitting area with cool water jets; a bridge to an island pool deck; and an ADA compliant access ramp. Additionally, the wading pool

will feature a beach entry and water features suitable for younger pool-goers.

The bathhouse renovations will include a family bathroom; individual shower/changing stalls; new sinks, counters and plumbing fixtures; and new lighting. The pool and bathhouse will be fully ADA compliant and will have new handicap parking in front of the building.

Residents are reminded to remain out of the construction area while the renovation is taking place for safety reasons. The construction work will conform to Montgomery County noise ordinances. Updates will be provided in future issues of the *Village News* and at *www.montgomeryvillage.com*.

### Letters to Editor

Editor

The Goshen Run non-resident parking controversy on Whetstone Drive has served to shine a light on the question of the County Roadway Reimbursement tax break, the value it delivers and the costs it extracts. The refusal of the Whetstone board and the Whetstone Community Manager to supply ready details of the County Road Way Reimbursement prompted research into the matter. The county refers to this tax rebate as "aid to Montgomery Village."

Just what are the facts? With 48.5 miles of eligible roads under the HOA Roadway Reimbursement Program in Montgomery Village, the county program is supposed to reimburse HOAs for eligible

roads at roughly the amount that the county spends to maintain its own roads. However, the actual reimbursement amount has steadily eroded due to Highway User Revenue shortfall and paid out \$1,000 per mile for 20 years before being reduced to \$250.

What does this mean to Whetstone? It appears that Whetstone Drive's 1.05 mile stretch would have returned Whetstone residents a dollar or two per household per year. In line with this, the 2016 WHC Income Statement shows an Annual Budget Income amount of \$1.00 for H4140 entitled Road Way Reimbursement.

But wait! One board member blogger placed the tax break at \$15,000 to \$35,000,

and the H4184 Unrealized Gain/Loss of \$9,836 closely resembles the \$22 per household figure tossed out by another board member at the Whetstone town hall meeting. Just what is the correct tax rebate value?

Timid compliance by the Whetstone board to retain the tax break is saddling Whetstone with county rules for governing Whetstone Drive, resulting in unchallenged nonresident parkers from Goshen Run, the use of Whetstone Drive as a shortcut by free riders and an influx of unwanted door-to-door solicitors.



### Personal safety tips

As we enjoy our summer activities, there are some common sense personal safety tips to remember when you take a walk along our streets or park your car:

- Limit your valuables by carrying only what you need.
- Have your cell phone easily accessible in case you need to call 911.
   Keep your cell phone fully charged as much as possible.
- Protect your laptop from theft by transporting it in a nondescript bag.
- When on the street, be alert and aware at all times. Most victims will be targeted because they appear not to be paying attention.
- Digital music players are a common target of robbers. Be wise about where you choose to use them in public. Wearing headphones or ear buds greatly reduces your ability to hear and distracts you from potential danger.
- ATM transactions should be made inside a store or at a location that is well lit and visible. Shield the key pad while you input your code. Have your card ready and do not count or display your money. Take your receipt with you.

- Trust your instincts. If you feel uncomfortable or threated by another person(s), seek help immediately. A whistle is a great device to have.
- Protect your vehicle from theft. Always lock your doors and glove compartment; never hide a spare key in your car.
- Never leave valuables unattended in the car or in a store.
- Whenever possible, park your car in a welllit area with plenty of walking traffic.

### Whetstone HOA budget and ballots

Formulation of the 2017 annual budget has been accomplished following in-depth board examination of current financial and program statements. Expenditure data for maintenance, non-maintenance and special contract budget categories were analyzed to determine projected 2017 budget goals for these budget categories. Annual assessments and contribution to current reserves were reviewed in light of current performance budget and justification data. The 2017 final budget will be published this fall.

#### **BALLOT UPDATE**

Under the leadership of elected board member and Treasurer Brian Clark, aided by Block Captains, volunteers will soon commence door-to-door homeowner visits to respond to questions and concerns related to the Whetstone ballot initiative. Ballots were mailed to homeowners this past June.

Campaign volunteers will distribute a ballot form and return envelope upon request to individual homeowners who still have not voted. A homeowner signature on the official envelope is required in order for your vote to be counted. The board is aware that some homeowners may not have had the opportunity for a variety of reasons to attend the several town hall meetings conducted since last June or misplaced the ballot

The volunteers are available to provide information on the ballot amendments. A

homeowner may also authorize people listed on a proxy vote form to vote on behalf of the owner for any and all covenant and by-law votes put forth to the members of the Whetstone HOA through a date to be entered.

### **NO PARKING**

The board discussed the legal opinion prepared by the board's attorney concerning the tax exemption status, should the board approve the installation of no parking signs on community streets. Currently the community is exempt from taxation on interest from the reserve funds and the county road reimbursement fee. Sign installation must meet county regulatory criteria if Whetstone is to continue its tax exempt status.

### ASSISTED LIVING FACILITY

A homeowner's request to open an assisted living facility in collaboration with a government agency was not viewed favorably. Additional information from the owner is needed prior to the rendering of a final decision by the board.

### LAKE WHETSTONE UPDATE

The dredge contractor has left the Whetstone dredging site, which has been restored except for some tree planting, scheduled for this fall. Next for the lake is repair of the concrete riser. The riser contains a sluice gate that controls water level and flow rates and has a metal grate on top of it to prevent large debris from entering the

structure. The metal grate will be removed, cleaned and re-coated.

Deteriorated concrete inside the structure will be repaired and the sluice gate will be replaced. This will require lowering the lake's water level by approximately 4-feet. The lowering of the lake will occur after Labor Day. Cranes will be used to remove and install the metal grate and sluice gate.

The lake was created in the late 1960s by building a dam across Whetstone Run in the Great Seneca subwater shed. It was originally designed to be a recreational lake and provide storm water management benefits. The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is responsible for structural maintenance of the lake. The last dredging occurred in 1985. ### Dog days of summer

The dog days of summer are with us. The many trees in our community provide shade from the sun and cooling benefits through the transpiration of water from their leaves. The Stedwick Homes Corporation waters entryway plantings to help maintain the attractiveness of those features. Montgomery County approved our plan to develop a rainscape, and we have built it. The cost will be partially reimbursed by Montgomery County, and we may see a minor reduction in Stedwick's Water Quality Protection Fees. It should reduce the volume and force of rainwater runoff into our local streams.

Pepco has agreed to provide replacement trees for those cut down earlier this year along the Pepco right-of-way adjacent to the Clusters II and Frenchton Place communities. The types of trees and locations will be identified and the trees will be planted next spring.

Thank you to our residents who place their trash out for collection in hard containers, rather than plastic bags. We are seeing some improvement in the number of residents using the hard containers. The trial installation of trash cans in selected areas of Stedwick has been expanded, and we are seeing a considerable amount of trash being placed in those new cans. Thank you to those of you who are using them.

The Stedwick Homes Corporation budget for 2017 is in the development process. The first draft of the budget was reviewed at the August board of directors meeting. Preliminary indications are that we will have a budget that provides the same level of services at approximately the same assessment level. If you have suggestion regarding the 2017 budget, please let us know.

Concerns about a 40% increase in Montgomery County's charges to Stedwick Homes Corporation to support the Commission of Common Ownership Communities, as well as the relatively poor sur-

face condition of Watkins Mill Road and the increased number of trailers being 'stored' on that road, were topics brought to the attention of Montgomery County Council President Nancy Floreen and 6th District Community Service Police Officer Scott Zimmerman, during a meeting hosted by Heron's Cove Condominium Association in late July. Thanks to Joe Simcox and the Heron's Cove Board of Directors for inviting Ms. Floreen and hosting that meeting.

The Law Offices of Miller, Miller & Canby have submitted a "sketch plan" for the redevelopment of the Montgomery Village Center. Interested residents may participate in the review process by sending written comments to the Development Application and Regulatory Coordination Division (DARC), M-NCPPC, 8787 Georgia Avenue, Silver Spring, MD 20910-3760, or by contacting the M-NCPPC lead reviewer. ### North Village August board meeting

by the North Village Board of Directors

The regular meeting of the North Village Board of Directors was held this past week on August 18. Since this article had to go to press on Monday, we were unable to cover news of the meeting. Look for full coverage of the meeting in our next article, which will appear on Friday, Sept. 9. Some business items on the agenda are the appointment of the nominating committee, approval of the election calendar in preparation for the upcoming board elections at the end of the year, the approval of the corporate calendar for the coming year and also a discussion of the draft 2017 budget that was prepared at an earlier meeting (see below). The board must vote to approve the publication of the proposed 2017 budget in the *Village News* prior to the actual approval of the budget itself, which will be on the agenda at the October board meeting.

### WORK CONTINUES ON THE 2017 BUDGET

Thanks to the dedicated efforts of Treasurer Jeanne Powell, the draft North Village budget for 2017 was completed at the budget meeting on August 4 with participation by nearly all board members. The budget was not voted on at Thursday's meeting since there needs to be more discussion and information generated before it is approved by the board for publication and passed. The proposed budget will be reported in a future article.

Generating the budget is always a difficult task. For example, how much should we set aside for snow removal? Last winter was extraordinary and the cost of snow removal far exceeded our expectations. Will next winter be the same? Should we set aside a greater amount of funds than last year at the expense of other pressing items in the budget? These are the types of difficult questions that the board must deal with in generating the budget. The board must balance the needs against the available funds while trying to avoid a significant assessment increase.

### **IMPROVING SECURITY**

One of the issues that was discussed at the 2017 budget planning meeting was the amount we are spending for our security company. Recall that our security costs nearly doubled last year, and the board is questioning if we are getting our money's worth from our security patrols. The board would like to take suggestions from our residents on ways that we may be able to get better performance from our security company. Some of the ideas that were tossed around by the board members were:

- Reduce the security patrols in neighborhoods where there have not been any incidents so that we can increase them in areas where there continues to be problems.
- 2. Change the hours of security coverage.
- Cut back on security (and security costs) in the winter months when there are fewer incidents.
- 4. Review the relationship between our security team and the Montgomery County police: Are they working well together and do the police respond quickly when called for more serious incidents? Do we need stationary coverage (fixed observation from parked cars) in the more difficult areas rather than infrequent and brief drive-throughs?

We welcome any suggestions from concerned residents. Please call or e-mail our community manager with your comments and suggestions at the number and address listed below. And remember, if you see suspicious activity anywhere in Montgomery Village please call the police non-emergency number at 301-279-8000. Of course, if it is an emergency dial 911. We want to keep criminal activity out of North Village.

### **Revised Parking Policy in effect**

by the Middle Village Board of

The Middle Village Parking Policy revision is now in effect. All vehicles parked overnight in the Middle Village community must have a 2016 Middle Village parking hang tag or they will be immediately towed – no exceptions. The revised policy provides each home with one additional parking tag (giving each home a total of three parking tags), which can be used in the homeowner's reserved parking space or any unmarked space. One additional parking tag per address can be purchased annually from ComSource starting in December.

Residents must now go to the ComSource office to get their parking tags. Permits will not be mailed. ID will be required to pick up the tag and homeowners must be current with their homeowner assessment fees to receive the additional tag.

If you are delinquent on your homeowner assessment fees, the previous rule of losing your reserved space, in addition to not receiving the third parking tag, still applies. The revised policy will be available to view on the ComSource website via Sourcelink.

All commercial vehicles must park on the street between the hours of 11 p.m. and 5 a.m. Any commercial vehicles parking in the parking lots between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m. will be towed.

Towing is in effect! A 2016 Middle Village parking hang tag must be displayed in the front car window—no exceptions!

#### **TRASH**

Trash throughout the community continues to be a problem—especially on sections of Ridgeline Drive. The association spends a significant amount of money because of how much trash—both bulk trash and litter—is present in the community on a daily basis.

Homeowners will be fined if they or their tenants violate the trash policy. Effective immediately, there will be a \$25 reward for picture or video proof of violations to the trash policy that identifies the violators. Picture or video proof is required to collect a reward, and some restrictions apply. All reports will remain anonymous. Trash policy violations include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Placing trash out in plastic bags instead of a trash receptacle with a lid.
- Trash/recycling put out on inappropriate days/non-pickup days.
- Placing trash on common area spaces instead of in front of home.

Trash includes loose trash, bagged trash, trash in cans and bulk trash.



### MV Kids Learn About Coconuts

A coconut is not actually a nut, but a drupe or stone fruit. Coconuts grow in bunches on a type of palm tree. It is grown inside a green husk that must be taken off. All parts of the coconut can be used. Coir or coconut fiber from the husk can be made into floor mats, brushes and mattresses. Charcoal can be made from the hard shell and the flesh can be eaten or processed into oil or milk and used in cooking, soaps and cosmetics. The coconut water can be sipped right from the coconut or used in recipes (like the smoothie, below).

1. Use a screwdriver or skewer to poke holes in the "eyes" of the coconut and drain the water.





### WMHS program helps students get on the right track for college



In the dog days of summer, Watkins Mill High School was, as you'd expect, strikingly quiet. But in Room A006, where the CollegeTracks program has been headquartered since early this year, things were buzzing. More than 30 students met with the college access program's staff and volunteers to get ready for their senior year and the demands related to the college admissions process. Organized in small groups, students worked on college essays and resumes, explored career choices and researched appropriate colleges; most groups were led by dedicated volunteers who come each week to work with the students.

Ariel, a senior in the program, says, "CollegeTracks provides structure for the beginning of our college careers."

In a classroom near the CollegeTracks office, another group of students met with "Smiley," a volunteer and entrepreneur by day who was teaching a mathematics prep class, helping students get ready to take standardized tests like the ACT and SAT in the fall. Geometry was the topic, and the students were engaged and responsive to the instructor's encouragement and take-charge attitude.

Upstairs in the computer center, another group of 20 or so students were working on college essays, FAFSA applications (Free Application for Federal Student Aid), and researching colleges that meet their needs and interests. Program Coordinator Lindsay Barclay and Program Assistant Dominic Chappell moved from student to student making sure each was on task and answered questions about the application process.

CollegeTracks was cofounded in 2003 at Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School by Executive Director Nancy Leopold, who herself had children at the school and saw first hand that some of her children's friends who came from low-income, immigrant and minority backgrounds had no clue how to navigate the complex admissions process. In most cases, they came from households where their parents had no experience with the American higher education system.

"Higher education is no longer optional. Those who attend college and technical school see higher earnings, less unemployment, better health, more fulfilling work, more opportunity and more socioeconomic mobility. We must close the opportunity gap—all the county's high school grads must have the opportunity to get to postsecondary education. Right now, too many do not. By expanding to Watkins Mill High School, College-Tracks can help hundreds more underserved students each year to get to the prosperous futures they deserve and the county needs them to have," said Leopold.

By all accounts, the program has proven to be a huge success and has been embraced by Watkins Mill High School and the community. Under the direction of Program Director Bridget Kasprzak, 151 rising seniors enrolled in the program, with another 26 rising juniors eager to start this fall. More seniors and juniors will enroll next year.

"The community has taken to the program in big way," says Kasprzak. "We received a warm welcome from Watkins Mill High School and are so pleased to have established a strong relationship with school administrators and the school community as a whole."

She emphasizes that support from the larger community has been gratifying. Collaboration has been established with Watkins Mill Partner Clusters and the Gaithersburg Chamber of Commerce. The business community at large

has come to the support of the program as well, connecting students with internships opportunities and spreading the word that volunteers are in demand who can spend two to six hours once a week helping students.

Currently, the program has 15 volunteers, five of whom oversee test prep, like Smiley. But more are needed. Criteria for selection includes daytime availability for several hours at least once a week, a college degree and the ability to sit side-by-side with a student and listen compassionately to what the student has to say.

Says Michele Parsonnet, who herself started as a volunteer with CollegeTracks and now coordinates the volunteer program: "The experience is powerful one. Our students have amazing stories to tell. As a volunteer, you see the power that higher education can have on the trajectory of a student's life."

Students are acutely aware of that power and the opportunity that going to college affords. The rapid growth of the program in a very short time is a testament to their understanding of that value.

"CollegeTracks provides friendship with new people, as well as access to many privileges," says Heidy, who will graduate from Watkins Mill in 2018.

CollegeTracks is an open program. Juniors are encouraged to join the new program during the second semester of their junior year. "However," says Kasprzak, "if a senior wants to join a month before graduation, we will welcome the student into our program."



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


