Over 50 residents, members of the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Board of Directors, MVF staff and Senator Nancy King and District 39 Delegates Charles Barkley and Kirill Reznik were in attendance.

Commander Patil began the meeting by saying he was enjoying getting to know and understand Montgomery Village, and he is always looking for ways to stay connected to the community. He noted that overall, recent crime trends for both the county and the 6th District have declined this year. In the Village, one of





Golf course development update/MOU executed

EVP'S MESSAGE

The number one question I get from residents is when houses are going to start popping up on the former golf course property. And my stock answer is always the same. Monument Realty is going through the county process, and the plans will be modified over time; I expect in 18 to 24 months there will probably be some construction. I check in with county planning staff and Monument Realty regularly to get the latest updates.

Planning staff has completed its review of the FEMA flood plain boundary correction, and has approved the revision. The approval clears the way for a Natural Resources Inventory (NRI) to be submitted soon, which, under normal conditions, would be approved within 6 weeks. Once the NRI is approved, Monument will submit a Preliminary Plan of Subdivision to M-NCPPC, which will provide for additional public comment. This process is expected to continue for 4 to 6 months.

Once the Preliminary Plan is approved, Monument will submit a site plan application for the project, which is another opportunity for public comment. The site plan process could take an additional 4 months. Then there is the building permit stage.

Another important update is the execution of the MOU between MVF and USL2 MR MONTGOMERY VILLAGE BUSINESS TRUST (Monument Realty), which the MVF Board authorized. The MOU provides for annexation of new residential units into MVF, specifies the conveyance of park property and improvements to MVF, as well as other requirements that both parties have to adhere to.

FRIENDLY DRONE ALERT/APPLE RIDGE POOL CONSTRUCTION

Final permit approval was received from Montgomery County to commence construction of the new pool and bathhouse. It took almost 100 days to get the site/sediment control permits, although 60 days had been planned by our general contractor, Keller Construction, in the construction schedule. Also, Keller Construction has informed MVF that it will share aerial pictures documenting construction on the site. The aerial pictures are taken from a drone that Keller Construction has licensed with the FAA. When available, these photos will be on the MVF website, which will show the construction progress.

COMMUNITY POLICING MEETING

A big thank you to 6th District Commander Dinesh Patil, who briefed over 50 residents during a community meeting hosted by the MVF Board of Directors. The commander started the meeting by sharing crime statistics in the 6th District, noting that for the most part, crime offenses are down as compared to last year.

He also discussed increased gang activity and recurring graffiti in our parks and commercial areas. He noted that the recent gang murders had been a major focus of his department.

Commander Patil mentioned how body cameras have been deployed to all county officers which he believes are an important accountability tool. The commander responded to many questions, ranging from the lack of parking enforcement of illegal commercial vehicles on public streets to the use of police officers at schools. MVF will continue to host community policing meetings so that residents can share their concerns and questions.

LAKE WHETSTONE RISER REPAIR/LAKE WATER TO DROP

Fortunately, MVF has an easement/agreement with Montgomery County Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to maintain the major infrastructure of Lake Whetstone and other storm water management facilities owned by MVF. DEP completed the dredging earlier this year and now will begin major repairs to the outfall structure located in the northern most section of Lake Whetstone.

DEP recently signed a contract with Norair and should commence work on the outfall structure within 30 days. An easement to allow the contractor to access the lake and store construction materials at the north dock area was executed between DEP and the Whetstone Homes Corporation. At some point during the construction project, the lake will be lowered between 3 and 4 feet, which will expose a large area of the shoreline and part of the lake bottom in shallower areas. The contractor will be placing safety fencing around the entire lake during the duration of construction.

2. The *Montgomery Village News* will make every effort to publish all letters received during the weeks prior to publication.

3. Typed letters and e-mail must be received no later than 5 p.m. on the Monday prior to publication and distribution, while handwritten letters must be received no later than noon on the Friday, one week prior to publication. When a holiday occurs on a deadline Monday, Letters to the Editor must be received no later than noon on the subsequent Tuesday prior to the Friday publication and distribution.

 Letters must bear the writer's name, address and telephone number for verification purposes. The sole use of pen names, initials or the complete omission of a signature will eliminate a letter from consideration from publication. A request from the author to withhold the name or mark the letter anonymous will eliminate the letter from consideration.

Our Montgomery County Councilmember, Roger Berliner, has provided us all with a new and simple method to express our objection to the huge increase that Pepco is seeking in our electricity rates. He is sponsoring an online petition that already has over 2,000 signatures. If you object to the increase, please sign the petition, called "Fight the Hike," at *tinyurl.com/gr7525d.*

Pepco's requested rate increase is \$15.80 per 1000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) of electricity per month, beginning May 2016, and continuing every month, forever. This increase would cost \$2 million to \$3 million per year, for all Village residents combined, for the indefinite future.

The principal purpose for the increase is to pay for the Wireless Smart Meters that Pepco installed, without its customers' approval, on all residences in Montgomery Village during 2012 and 2013, plus associated profits. This increase must be approved by the Maryland Public Service Commission (PSC) to become effective. To gain the PSC's approval, Pepco must prove to the PSC that the Wireless Smart Meter System has provided more benefits to the customers than the System cost. Pepco claims that the System is "leading to an enhanced customer experience."

Before the PSC decides if it will grant the increase, or any part of it, the PSC has asked for the views of Pepco's customers, that is, you. If you approve of

Editor:

You had to be in the room! The room...the MVF Office at 3 p.m. on September 16. The long awaited WHC amendment ballot count took place fully ten days after the voting deadline of September 6. Why the delay? Well, it took ten days to assemble the WHC ballot counters. Were they reluctant to face the music? So much for commitment!

Yes, you had to be in the room to learn the results of the Whetstone amendment ballot vote. Every proposed amendment failed. Despite the fact that "For" votes uniformly exceeded "Against" votes, it was the two-thirds quorum threshold that signaled the landslide defeat...that, coupled with a 71% turnout.

The two-thirds quorum threshold (298) and the 71% turnout (315) resulted in a thin threshold of failure (315 - 298 = 17). With 315 acceptable ballots and a quorum requirement of 298 in a community of 447 households, it required only 18 (17 + 1) "Against" or "No Votes" to defeat amendments 1, 2, 4 and 5. The amendment 3 quorum requirement is 60%, or 269, because it includes finance, making the threshold of failure 47.

How close was it?

It wasn't close at all. Amendments 1, 2, 4 and 5 exceeded the threshold of failure by a factor of 3-6; amendment 3, by a factor of 2-3. These persistent factors ensured that failure of the ballot amendment was evident early in the vote counting process. Needless to say, the WHC Board members were shocked by these results, some in actual disbelief.

the only increases is Residential Burglary, but he reported the incidents are mainly concentrated around vacant apartment trespassers. Patil presented some heat maps to illustrate this point.

On the issue of Theft from Autos, Patil stressed the need to lock car doors and not leave valuables in plain sight. He admired the fact that many residents felt safe enough to not have to lock their cars, but advised that these crimes happen because criminals look for the easy target – unlocked cars.

To help mitigate both these issues, Patil said he hopes to apply different strategies to the area, including a Patrol Investigation Unit and possibly officers on Bike Patrol. He said having a greater visible presence will help cut down on these crimes of opportunity. He noted that in the past year, deploying details specifically to areas where robberies had a high occurrence kept that crime down; Patil said he would use this strategy again this year, and apply it to other types of crimes and areas as needed.

The commander also discussed issues surrounding potential development and vacant buildings/property in Montgomery Village. He noted that he is excited about positive changes coming to the Village, but in the meantime, his staff is working to minimize trespassers to those sites. Patil said officers are being sent to these locations during nighttime hours to look for signs that people are there, and are getting them out.

He listened to numerous examples of parking and overcrowding issues from the audience. Although Patil sympathized with the community, he said a solid solution has yet to be conceived. Until then, his officers can only deal with cars that are illegally parked, and in many cases, the cars are moved around just enough to abide by the laws. He did say he would have specific examples looked into and taken care of when appropriate, and even looked into a few specific examples immediately following the meeting.

Lastly, he mentioned the presence of gangs in the Village. Much like the robberies, gang incidents are mostly centralized in one location. Patil noted persistence on the part of his officers and other units in sharing information that leads to the fairly quick arrest of many gang members. He noted that a few small local gangs pop up from time

to time, but police are able to spot trends and similarities to crimes that make dealing with them easier. Patil said that the problem with territorial gangs like MS-13 is that they recruit young and are being told what to do. "They're very organized at the top," he said.

The Commander noted one of the best ways to head off this activity is to reach the kids in schools. He said that there are personnel at every high school in the county, and that the police work with the school system, the Department of Health and Human Services and the Identity Program, as well as other organizations to engage with and encourage youth, rather than leave them behind.

As a way to aid in recording incidents, body cameras have now been deployed on all Montgomery County Police Officers. Patil said of officers are getting used to the change and the addition of the technology. He is confident it will be a useful tool to help capture context of situations, rather than just written reports, often acting as an "electronic witness" for many situations. For large incidents, he and superiors always review the footage.

In the area of communication, Patil said that the police need to reach more people in as many ways as possible. He commented that he will personally be implementing an e-newsletter in the near future, which residents will have the opportunity to sign up for to receive. He also provided many forms of contact and direct links to online resources to the audience; Patil wants to be accessible to the community. This information is also posted online at *www*. montgomeryvillage.com; choose "Local Resources" from the "About MV" menu on the blue bar.

For the future, Commander Patil hopes to be able to add more officers to his staff, which would allow him to diversify the types of patrol teams available to tackle specific situations. For the present, he said it would be helpful to have analytical help in tracking data. Either of those initiatives is subject to county funding and updated staffing plans. For now, he is dedicated to more outreach opportunities and communication efforts with Village residents, and encourages residents to contact the police. As the current MCPD slogan reminds, when you '"See Something, Say Something."

Social Security announces new online service for replacement cards

The Social Security Administration introduced the expansion of online services for residents of Maryland available through its my Social Security portal at www. socialsecurity.gov/myaccount. Carolyn W. Colvin, Acting Commissioner of Social Security, recently announced that residents of Maryland can use the portal for many replacement Social Security number (SSN) card requests. This will allow people to replace their SSN card from the comfort of their home or office, without the need to travel to a Social Security office.

"I'm thrilled about this newest online feature to the agency's my Social Security portal and the added convenience we are providing residents of Maryland," Colvin said. "We continue to provide world-class customer service to the public by making it safe, fast and easy for people to do business with us online and have a positive government experience."

The agency is conducting a gradual roll out of this service; Maryland is one of the states, plus the District of Columbia, where this option is available. Throughout 2016, the agency will continue to expand the service option to other states. This service will mean shorter wait times for the public in the more than 1,200 Social Security offices across the country and allows staff more time to work with customers who have extensive service needs.

U.S. citizens age 18 or older and who are residents of Maryland can request a replacement SSN card online by creating a my Social Security account. In addition, they must have a U.S. domestic mailing address, not require a change to their record (such as a name change) and have a valid driver's license, or state identification card in some participating states.

My Social Security is a secure online hub for doing business with Social Security, and more than 26 million people have created an account. In addition to Maryland residents replacing their SSN card through the portal, current Social Security beneficiaries can manage their account-change an address, adjust direct deposit, obtain a benefit verification letter or request a replacement SSA-1099. Medicare beneficiaries can request a replacement Medicare card without waiting for a replacement form in the mail. Account holders still in the workforce can verify their earnings history and obtain estimates of future benefits by looking at their Social Security Statement online.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR BUILDING A

Here are the basics for building a pumpkin racer, based on MVF recreation staff experience. However, based on your selection of pumpkin and wheels, you may find other hardware preferable for achieving the best forward roll on your pumpkin racer.



kits which come with the following: four wheels, two threaded axles, four large washers, eight washers and twelve nuts. We find this assortment of hardware works well with most available at the office or at the race. pumpkins.

The following steps will show you how to create your own pumpkin racer.



Get a real pumpkin and view it from various sides to figure out which way you want your pumpkin to sit. Do you want it to sit upright or do you want it lying down? Once you've determined that, then insert your first axle completely through the pumpkin. Keep in mind that you want to make sure that when the wheels are installed on the axles, you will have the pumpkin off the ground.



Place a large washer closest to the pumpkin followed by a nut close to the large washer. The wheel assembly starts with a nut that will hold the wheel in place, then a washer, followed by the wheel, then another washer and the final nut. Repeat on each side of the axle. After assembly, you can adjust the width of the wheels by moving the nuts and washers.



Repeat this process for the next axle. Keep in mind that you want to try to keep the axles parallel in order to make your racer go as straight as possible. The final step is to decorate your racer to make it uniquely yours. Spice up your racer with style. The more creative, the better, but please rememberno pyrotechnics or explosives!

Apple Ridge Pool renovation update

The Apple Ridge Pool renovation is underway. Construction fencing has been installed around the renovation site, the pool has been emptied, all pool furniture and external supplies have been moved and demolition of the pool shell and deck has begun. Work on the interior of the bath house has started as well: renovations will include a family bathroom; individual shower/changing stalls; new sinks, counters and plumbing fixtures; and new lighting. The pool and bathhouse will be fully ADA compliant and will have new handicap parking in front of the building.

The pool and bathhouse renovation will take approximately 9 months, and the pool is scheduled to re-open for the 2017 pool season. The new "leisure" pool will feature a "lazy river" or current

channel; an open body slide; a double family slide; water features including dump buckets and pipe falls; spray ground; beach entry; in-water sun-shelf lounging area; an underwater bench sitting area with cool water jets; a bridge to an island pool deck; and an ADA compliant access ramp. Additionally, the wading pool will feature a beach entry and water features suitable for younger pool-goers.

During the renovation, the tennis courts will still be open, but will only be accessible through the tennis court gate on the side of the courts closest to the Georgetown Hill Early School (GHES). All other gates will be locked. The basketball court will also only be accessible through the MVF greenspace between the tennis courts and the GHES property. The soccer field will be accessible through the MVF greenspace along the west and north sides of the pool (there is a pedestrian tunnel under Apple Ridge Road that leads from the MVF Office parking lots to the described MVF greenspace).

The contractor, Keller Construction Management, will periodically be flying a friendly camera drone over the site to get aerial shots of the progress of the renovation. These images will be shared in the Village News and online at www. *montgomeryvillage.com* as they are available. Keller's drone is registered with the FAA and will only be used for photographing the renovation.

Residents are reminded to remain out of the construction area while the renovation is taking place for safety reasons. The construction work will conform to Montgomery County noise ordinances.

NORTHGATE NEWS

September updates

Northgate's contractors continue cleanup from the September 7 storm that caused substantial tree damage. Mead Tree was on site quickly to deal with the emergency situations, and is currently removing a number of fallen trees. McFall & Berry is completing branch and other cleanup. The cost of the storm damage will be high.

At the September board meeting, Mead Tree won a competitive bid to remove other trees that pose problems. That is an additional \$15,000 from the community Tree Reserve Fund.

The board also approved the FY2017 budget for publication. It includes a one-dollar per quarter increase, which is primarily to cover the increase in the Montgomery County Water Quality Assessment fee.

Montgomery County has notified the board that the McKendree courtyard project is advancing. A meeting with the responsible parties will take place shortly. We will keep you updated via this column.

TRASH!

Montgomery County requires that trash be stored in trash containers with tight fitting lids. This applies to both single-family houses and townhouses. Placing trash out in plastic bags or in open containers is causing a substantial litter and trash problem in Northgate. Foxes, birds and other varmints are ripping bags and tipping open containers. Please do your bit by properly storing your trash!

The board is asking if you see a resident putting out regular or bulk trash other than on the evening before pickup (or early on the pickup day), that you please report it to *northgate* HC@comsource.com. You will remain anonymous. There continues to be a dumping issue in certain neighborhoods, and we need your help to resolve it.

Trash pickup in The Points and Overlea is on Mondays and Thursdays. Every other subdivision has pickups on Tuesdays and Fridays. Both regular and bulk trash should be placed out the evening before pickup. If you need a bulk trash pickup, please place your items out on the following schedule:

Thursdays: Overlea and **The Points**

Fridays: Apple Ridge, Dorsey's Regard, McKendree I and II, Shadow Oak and Williams Range.

All bulk pickups must be placed curbside. Residents of Overlea and McKendree I and II must bring their bulk items to the curb. No recyclable items will be taken as bulk, nor will construction material generated by a contractor. If a homeowner has a carpet or rug contractor replacing rugs or carpet in the home, the contractor is responsible for the removal of the carpet or rugs.

If your trash pickup is missed, please call Potomac Disposal at 301-294-9700.

ZIKA CONCERNS

As noted in previous columps, the most common mosquito in our area is the Asian Tiger. Maryland is also in range of the Aedes mosquito, which spreads the Zika virus. We ask that you help prevent mosquito problems in the community by eliminating standing water sources such as: clogged rain gutters, tires,

buckets, cans, bottles, flower pots, bird baths, children's toys, rain barrels and pet food and water dishes. The most effective method of controlling mosquitoes is reducing or eliminating the containers where the mosquitoes breed. Draining or removal of water holding containers will help control mosquitoes.

Montgomery County has a new website to educate residents about mosquitoes and the Zika virus. The information can be found at www.montgomery countymd.gov/HHS-Program/ PHS/ZikaVirus/ZikaVirus.html.

Part of the information on the site includes:

The best way to prevent the Zika virus infection is to avoid mosquito bites. Currently, there is no vaccine to prevent Zika virus infection. According to the CDC:

- Use insect repellents containing DEET, picaridin or IR3535 on exposed skin. Apply insect repellents after applying sunscreen.
- Treat clothing with permethrin or purchase permethrin-treated clothing.
- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants when possible.
- Use air conditioning or window / door screens to keep mosquitoes outside, or sleep under a mosquito net.
- Empty standing water from containers such as buckets, bowls, flower pots, wheelbarrows and children's outdoor toys.

Stedwick updates

School is back in session, and we need to be watchful for children going to and from school. The school crossing guards deserve our respect and compliance.

The Stedwick landscape contractor has built three rainscapes in our community, two in Clusters III and one in Clusters I, and Stedwick Homes Corporation has received approval from Montgomery County for partial reimbursement of the costs; we should see a minor reduction in its Water Quality Protection Fees. Those improvements are designed to reduce the volume and force of rainwater runoff and erosion into our local streams.

The Watkins Mill Pool tot lot is in the early stage of being replaced, and the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF) Department of Recreation, Parks and Culture wants to hear from interested residents on the proposed design and equipment. The MVF Recreation Committee will hold a community meeting on Monday, Oct. 10 to review design concepts and to solicit resident comments on the proposed plans. The time and location of that meeting will be advertised in the Village News, on the MVF web site and with flyers to nearby residents. This meeting will provide an opportunity for Stedwick residents and especially those living in the Club Hill and Clusters III communities to participate in the redesign and redevelopment of the Watkins Mill Tot Lot. Based on input from the residents, the Recreation Committee will make a recommendation to the MVF Board of Directors.

Portions of Watkins Mill Road between the Post Office and the other side of Seneca Creek have been resurfaced. That work has significantly improved the drivability of that portion of the road. There are marks on the road surface indicating additional work is to be done. Identifying a concern about the condition of the road at the late July meeting with Nancy Floreen, President of the

Montgomery County Council, may have prompted that improvement.

A meeting with 6th District Police Commander Dinesh Patil was hosted by the MVF Board of Directors on September 15. There was an overflow crowd, including some residents from Stedwick, with lots of concerns. Many of the concerns expressed were about lack of insight into police involved activities in Montgomery Village. The increasing "industrialization" of Watkins Mill and Stedwick roads were brought to his attention. Subsequently, four "stored" trailers have disappeared from Watkins Mill Road. Commander Patil seems to be following through on his commitment to listening and responding to issues that are brought to his attention. The non-emergency number for the 6th District Police is 301-279-8000. Commander Patil's e-mail address is 6DCommander@montgomery countymd.gov.

Montgomery Councilmember Craig Rice will be holding a community meeting at 6:30 p.m. on September 28 at Watkins Mill High School, 10301 Apple Ridge Road. This will be an opportunity to ask questions or express concerns to him.

Keeping Whetstone beautiful

As a member of the Whetstone Maintenance Committee, I am always pleased to hear a non-resident compliment the beauty of our community. Within the last two months, a police officer stated that he always enjoys driving through Whetstone, and a young environmental worker exclaimed, "I would so like to live here if I could."

There are still common space areas that need improvement, but on the whole, I suspect that all of us who live here agree that our community has a very attractive appearance. This is largely due to the maintenance committee's monthly inspections. Also contributing is resident input to the committee. And, of course, resident assessments to fund the upkeep of our common areas are essential.

The appearance of individual homes is obviously critical to the attractiveness of our community. To ensure that private properties do not become a blemish, the Whetstone Homes Corporation (WHC) pays for a Private Property Inspection every second year. This inspection is conducted by personnel employed by the Montgomery Village Foundation. The Architectural Review Board, under the auspices of the MVF, also plays a key role by ensuring that the architectural standards of Montgomery Village are maintained when changes to the exterior of a home are contemplated.

Recently, a "Vote Whetstone" volunteer delivering flyers door-to-door informed me that several homes in Whetstone were in need of exterior maintenance. This sort of issue must not be permitted to get out of hand. Residents should be aware that the Montgomery County Department of Housing and Community Affairs sets minimal standards for property upkeep. Among these standards are:

- All exterior components of the house-the foundation, walls, stairs, windows, doors and roof- must be kept in good repair;
- All wood surfaces must be protected against decay;
- Owners must keep the dwelling unit free of flaking or peeling paint;
- Owners are responsible for maintenance of trees and shrubbery; and
- Owners are responsible for maintenance of all paved surfaces so that they remain in good condition at all times. If you see a home in violation of these county standards,

FOURTH QUARTER ASSESSMENTS DUE **OCTOBER 1**

If you have not done so already, please remember to send in your October assessment payment to the Montgomery Village Foundation (MVF). Fourth Quarter assessments are due by Saturday, Oct. 1. One check covers both MVF and North Village assessments. Either mail your payment with the coupon and envelope you received last December, or place your payment and coupon in the drop box in the MVF Office parking lot.

EARLY FALL MAINTENANCE

When you read this article, summer will have drawn to a close and we will be in the first week of autumn. With the change of season, your board of directors is busy with early fall maintenance tasks. We will keep you informed of all the maintenance activities.

The strip painting of parking spaces and curbs in Picton was started and should have been completed this past week. Residents have been cooperative in moving their cars as instructed so that the workers could access the curbs and parking spaces.

Some of you may be wondering about the construction activity along the path in the Highland Hall community that was recently completed. It was to repair a section of the pipeline that had been detected by robot sensors that are sent through the pipe on a scheduled basis. The pipeline, which runs from Texas to New Jersey, carries some volatile gas products, so we certainly want that pipeline to be maintained at the highest level of repair.

MEETING WITH POLICE

On September 15, Commander Dinesh Patil of the 6th District of the Montgomery County Police Department presented an update on crime in and around the Village as well as new department initiatives. It was mentioned that all police in Montgomery County now have body cameras. We were pleased to hear that the department is starting bike patrols in the South Village and Cider Mill apartment areas. Right now there are two bike

patrols, but the police will try to increase this number. There was discussion of the gang activity in the Village, primarily from the gang called MS-13, which has been very active in the Silver Spring area. Commander Patil presented density maps showing locations of the areas with the highest levels of crime activity in and around the Village. This meeting was well attended, and we hope to have quarterly meetings, as we all feel they are very important.

MORE ON TRASH

Once again, we must remind all residents that it is important that you place your trash in trash cans with lids; don't just place it in a plastic trash liner. If you do not have a lid on your trash can, or if you just put your trash out in plastic bags, the crows, squirrels and other critters will get into the trash and scatter it. It is also important that you do not put out your trash before 7 p.m. on the night before the trash collection day, and that you store your trash can out of sight in your yard or garage.

Maple Leaf Water Main project to begin

The Washington Suburban Sanitation Commission (WSSC) will begin replacing the water mains within Montgomery Village, and the Fairidge community will soon see work commencing. The Maple Leaf Water Main Replacement Project estimated construction date is the end of September. The water mains were installed in the 1970s and are nearing the end of their life cycle.

The affected streets will include: Dellcastle Court, Dellcastle Road, DeSoto Court, Doolittle Court, Doolittle Street, Gravier Court, Mastenbrook Court, Mastenbrook Place, Meadowcroft Court, Meadowcroft Lane, Nordstrom Court, Octavia Court and Shrewsbury Court.

The anticipated work hours will be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. with an estimated completion date of fall 2017. Water service may be interrupted for a few hours, while the new main line is being constructed. Customers will receive a 48-hour advance notice for service interruptions. A 48-hour advance notification will be distributed to residents in the event of any parking restrictions or street closures.

MV Kids Learn About Niagara Falls

Niagara Falls is the name for three waterfalls that share the international border between Ontario, Canada and the state of New York. They form the southern end of the Niagara Gorge. From largest to smallest, the three waterfalls are the Horseshoe Falls, the American Falls and the Bridal Veil Falls.



American Falls and Bridal Veil Falls

American Falls receive approximately 10 percent of the flow from Niagara River, with most of the rest going over Horseshoe Falls. American Falls and Horseshoe Falls are separated by Goat Island. The ledge of the American Falls is jagged from numerous rock falls over the past 150 years, which have resulted in the huge mound of rock at its base. The height of the American Falls ranges between 70 to 110 feet and the crest is about 950 feet long.

Bridal Veil Falls is the smallest of the three waterfalls that make up Niagara Falls. It is located on the American side (in New York State). Luna Island separates it from the American Falls and Goat Island separates it from the Horseshoe Falls. Bridal Veil Falls faces to the northwest and has a crest 56 feet wide.



Horseshoe Falls is the most powerful waterfall in North America and receives about 90 percent of the flow from

Niagra River. The height of Horseshoe Falls is 167 feet and about 600,000 gallons of water flow over the falls per second.

The 80-foot long Maid of the Mist a diesel-powered



600-passenger boat departs every 15 minutes from the docks past the base of the American Falls, then into the basin of the magnificent Canadian Horseshoe Falls.

Local kids spend day off school "Gleaning"

On September 12, 13 youngsters and four adults from Covenant United Methodist Church (CMUC) traveled to First Fruits Farm in Freeland, Md. to be Harvest Helpers. After a short orientation about the working farm and a prayer, they headed to the potato fields where one row of potatoes had been turned up for them to collect. At least they did not have to dig them.

It was a bright, sunny and dry day in the fields. The kids jumped right in to the process of filling 5 gallon buckets of potatoes, tossing the bad ones back into the field. When the bucket was full, it was lifted to a tractor-towed wagon with 8 crates each holding about 1200 pounds of spuds.

The church Harvest Helpers, along with Youth Director David Post, planned to harvest for about 2.5 hours. With one row done in less than an hour, Farmer Bill turned up another row. Gleaning is the process of picking up the missed harvest. The gleaners really did not have much to do, as the harvesters were very thorough, and after that second row was done, they still had some time to offer, so another ½ row was finished. In all, the group harvested almost 8,500 pounds of potatoes, about 2 ½ times what a crew their size usually does. These potatoes were loaded onto a flatbed semi-truck and were on their way to the Maryland Food Bank for distribution to 850 families.

The CMUC group felt so good about their accomplishment, they cooled off at Kilgore Falls before heading back home to Montgomery Village.

Rental Facilities in the Village
